

The City Council. The City Council met in regular monthly session Monday night at the City Hall. All members of the Council were present with the exception of J. G. Harris and R. N. Hudson. Mayor Barry called the body to order. Clerk Tousey read the minutes of last meeting which were approved. Two ordinances were read and adopted by the council. The disposition of claims and accounts was taken up by the clerk and all allowed. The following resolutions were read on the assessorship of Gov. Goebel and approved, and ordered to be spread on the minutes, also that they be given to the BRECKENRIDGE NEWS and Courier Journal for publication.

RESOLUTIONS IN DEATH OF GOEBEL. WHEREAS, Certain newspapers of the State of Kentucky, and particularly some of the city of Louisville, together with the professional office hunters have through the past eight months scattered broadcast throughout the State, articles and speeches filled with the vilest political rot and the most incendiary speeches and anarchistic threats that has ever been the misfortune of the people of our Commonwealth to read and listen to. And WHEREAS, As a result of such conduct our citizens have become so excited and incensed that the present disgusting state of affairs exists at this City and it is in danger of spreading to the rest of the State.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Cloverport, Kentucky, That we condemn in unspicable terms the course of such newspapers and their utterances, the incendiary speeches of the politicians, the existing lawlessness at our seat of Government, and last but not with deeper feeling, the assassination of Governor Goebel. He is further resolved, That we deplore the death of Governor Goebel the State of Kentucky has lost one of her most eminent citizens and the Democratic party a wise and illustrious leader and one worthy the name of statesman and Kentuckian. Further Resolved, That we deplore the untimely and violent death of our matchless leader, Gov. Wm. Goebel, by the treacherous hand of a hidden assassin, and extend our sincere sympathy to his bereaved family. May the murderers, guilty culprits be apprehended and given the extreme penalty of the law.

Apply to BRECKENRIDGE NEWS OFFICE. Ordinance No. 32. An Act to Enforce Vaccination. THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF Cloverport, Kentucky, do ordain: Sec. 1. That all persons of the age of twenty-one and over, who have not been vaccinated, or vaccinated, not successfully, shall within one month after the Mayor shall at any time issue his proclama-tion, under their care, custody and control, procure their own vaccination or re-vaccination as the case may be. Sec. 2. All parents, guardians or other persons having the care, custody or control of any child or children, or who may have in their employ any minor or minors, shall have the same vaccinated, and every parent, guardian and person that may have the care, custody or control of any child born hereafter, shall have said child vaccinated within twelve months after its birth or after it comes under his or her care, custody or control. Sec. 3. All persons coming into the City of Cloverport to abide or become citizens who have not been successfully vaccinated, or who have children under their care, custody or control who have not been successfully vaccinated, shall procure the vaccination of themselves and said children within one month after coming into the city. Sec. 4. Each and every person mentioned in the three foregoing sections who are required to have themselves and those under their care, custody or control successfully vaccinated or re-vaccinated as the case may be, shall be fined not less than one nor more than twenty-five dollars for every failure to comply with the requirements imposed upon them in the respective sections. Sec. 5. That after the Mayor shall issue his proclamation as set out in section one of this act it shall be the duty of the City Physician to vaccinate or re-vaccinate all indigent persons in the city who have not been successfully vaccinated, and who are not able to procure vaccination. Sec. 6. For the failure of any who are not able to procure vaccination for himself or those under his care, custody or control, to have said physician perform said vaccination as required in the preceding section, they shall be fined not less than one nor more than twenty-five dollars. Sec. 7. All vaccinations performed under the foregoing sections shall be with pure vaccine matter. Sec. 8. The City Physician shall furnish to the Council of the City of Cloverport a true list, under oath, of the indigent persons vaccinated by him, with the charges thereon, which shall not exceed twenty-five cents for each successful vaccination, and the Council shall order the charges paid out of the City treasury. Posted and approved February 5, 1900. Attest: J. A. BARRY, Mayor. T. C. TOUSEY, Clerk. Ordinance No. 31. An Act to protect the Jail and Jail Property and prevent persons from interfering with prisoners. THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF Cloverport, Kentucky, do ordain: Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, other than the Mayor, Police Judge, Members of the City Council, persons employed by the City of Cloverport, Kentucky, and persons under arrest, in custody under order of Court or serving a jail sentence, to enter or go into the City Jail or City Jail yard or inclosure or to hold any communication whatever with any person confined in the City Jail or City Jail yard under order of Court or awaiting trial, except by permission of the City Marshal. Any person violating this ordinance shall be fined not less than one nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offense. Passed and Approved February 5, 1900. Attest: J. A. BARRY, Mayor. T. C.
