TEMPORARY ALIMONY ALLOWED

Mrs. Annie E. Weatherford, Daughter of Ex-Judge A. M. Pulliam.

Last Wednesday Mrs. Annie E. Weatherford, of Louisville, daughter of A. M. Pulliam, of Harned, former county judge, was allowed temporary alimony of \$40 a month by an order of Judge Shackelford Miller, of that city, in her suit for divorce against Philip D. Weatherford, who is well known in Breckenridge county. The plaintiff made the charges of cruelty and failure to support, while the defendant, who has set up a counterclaim, takes the allegations of abandonment and improper conduct. In the course of the proof offered it was shown that Mr. Weatherford's net income was about \$3,500. He is employed as a traveling salesman by the Van B. Nelson Clothing Company, of Louisville.

It will be remembered that Mrs. Weatherford brought suit about the middle of August for legal separation and \$30 a week alimony, and caused the arrest and detention of her husband under bonds of \$1,000, alleging that he was about to leave the State. The bringing of the suit and the arrest of Mr. Weatherford caused considerable surprise in Louisville and this county, because of the prominence of the parties. Mrs. Weatherford claims that she went to California for her health, that her husband sent her \$50 monthly, on his agreement, for her support, but, after a time, his contributions ceased and she was forced to borrow money to return to Louisville. She also claimed that her husband's income was \$4,000 a year.

On August 24 Weatherford filed his answer, accompanied by a counterclaim, in which he asked an absolute decree of divorce on the double charge of abandonment and improper conduct. He claimed that his wife abandoned him and did not go to California on account of her health, that her health is good and that she is capable of supporting herself as a milliner. He also charged her with fits of bad temper, with beating him and with extravagance.

Will Not Remain Permanently.

TOO POPULAR WITH THE GIRLS.

Cause Sam Poole's Arrest, He Says—Hazelwood "Dope" Fiend.

Sam Poole and William Hazelwood, Federal prisoners from Breckenridge county in the Daviess county jail, are two of the most unusual characters who ever appeared before Commissioner Lindsey, who gave them a preliminary hearing at Owensboro last week. As stated in the News last week, Poole is a one-armed negro from Hardinsburg and Hazelwood a white man whose home is at Glendene. They were arrested by Deputy United States Marshal C. T. Nichols, on the charge of retailing liquor without a license.

Poole is an old and comical negro and Hazelwood an alleged "dope" fiend. When Poole went on the stand to testify in his own behalf he stated that the witnesses for the United States had told the truth. "I ain't gwine to tell no lie," he said, "cause it might damage my chances wid de Lord." He is apparently about seventy years old, but he declared that two of the witnesses against him, who were negroes, "had it in for him," because he was so popular with the girls, but that they had no show at all, and that they joined forces to get him out of the way.

He asked to be allowed to go back home. "Ef you is a puttin' me in jail jest 'cause you want me back here, boss, 'tain't no use," he said, " 'Cause I'll come back." The commissioner had to comply with the law, however, and Sam went to jail. The witnesses who went to Owensboro to testify in the case said that Poole, in spite of his age and one arm, is the highest jumper and the nimblest dancer in Breckenridge county.

Hazelwood, as stated last week, waived examining trial and was sent back to jail with Poole to await the action of the Federal grand jury. Marshal Nichols says that he ate morphine almost continually after being placed under arrest until he took the bottle away from him. The government physician at Owensboro is now trying to cure him of the morphine habit.

Reduction in Homeseekers' Rates.

The Rock Island to-day announces a very material reduction in homeseekers' rates to its Southwestern territory. Heretofore the homeseekers' rate has been fixed on a basis of approximately one fare plus \$2 for the round trip.

The new rates are about 75 per cent of the regular one-way rate for the round trip, and tickets carry the same limit and all the privileges of stop-over, diverse route and side-trips as at the former rate. The dates of sale are the first and third Tuesdays of October, November and December.

DEATH OF LOUIS LIGHTFOOT.

Experienced Cook and Useful Negro—Stood Well in His Race.

Louis Lightfoot, considered one of Cloverport's best colored citizens, died last Wednesday morning at 3:15 o'clock at his home here. It is supposed that his death was due to consumption. He had been seriously ill for about two weeks and in failing health since the middle of June. He was fifty-seven years of age.

Lightfoot was a cook by occupation for many years, having been employed by the hotels here, and lately by the Henderson Route. He was at one time treasurer of the United Brothers of Friendship, a local fraternal organization, and stood well among the members of his race. At the time of his death he was a trustee of the colored Baptist church.

His wife, mother, one sister, and two brothers, Thos. and Carence, of New Albany, survive.

The funeral was held from Asbury Methodist church Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. W. H. Pope, the pastor, conducting the service. The interment was at the colored cemetery, on the Hardinsburg and Cloverport turnpike. The funeral was largely attended.
