LIFE ON AN ARMY TRANSPORT.

Peyton Eskridge, Soldier, Sends The News a Description.

Peyton Eskridge, who recently returned from the Philippines, where he served in the army, has sent the News a description of life on a government transport. The description was written by William L. Miester, a private in the Twelfth infantry, stationed in the Philippines, and was brought home by Mr. Eskridge. It will be noticed that it is written in what might be called "poetical prose."

Life on an Army Transport.

Were you ever on a United States army transport sailing from Frisco harbor to the Philippines? I mean as a regular soldier, enlisted for three years to fight for flag and country.

As she lies out in the harbor in her virgin coat of white she looks like a floating palace, but inside she is a perfect freight. She is not what she is painted; no, not by any means. She has a very greasy interior, made so by slum and beans.

You are stored away between decks, down near the water line, tiny port holes amid air and often amid bine. Your bed is a piece of canvas stretched in an iron frame, held in place at regular intervals by a rope and eyelet game. You are rammed and jammed
