The vegetable canning factory of the J. T. Polk company burned at Greenwood, Ind., last Wednesday. The loss is estimated at \$220,000. The fire started in one of the packing rooms and an explosion of gasoline spread the flames to other buildings. The entire plant was destroyed. The factory was the largest of its kind in the world. The loss was completely covered by insurance and the plant will be immediately rebuilt at Greenwood.
