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BY A QUAKE AND FIRE

Kingston, Fair Capital of Jamaica, Quickly Reduced.

FIRE SPRINGS FROM DEBRIS

Many of the Most Important Buildings Were Destroyed and There Was Serious Loss of Life—Anxiety Felt For Safety of American Tourists. Latest Dispatches.

St. Augustine, Fla., Jan. 18.—Wireless messages received at the station on Anastatia Island by Chief Electrician Elkins say that Kingston is sinking gradually; that many holes and cracks 100 feet deep were formed by the earthquake, and that grave fears are felt that the entire city will slip into the bay.

St. Thomas, D. W. I., Jan. 17.—It is estimated that 1,000 persons perished by the earthquake and fire at Kingston, that 90,000 persons are homeless, and that many hundreds were injured. According to late reports from Jamaica the property damage in Kingston alone is fully \$10,000,000.

Looting and disorder, including raids on run shops by the blacks, followed the catastrophe, but prompt repressive measures restored order. Panic prevails, however, especially as the earth shocks continued and great numbers of the city's population have fled to the neighboring countryside.

Sir James Ferguson, vice chairman of the Royal Mail Steamship company, is among the killed. The loss of life is very great, but the exact numbers are not yet known. The dead are being buried under smoldering ruins.

The governor and his party are safe. It is reported that an extinct volcano in the parish of Portland is showing signs of activity, but this has not been verified.

The devastation would appear to have been confined to the vicinity of Kingston, one dispatch giving ten miles as the radius of the damage. The rest of the island, including Port Antonio, does not seem to have suffered severely.

The first shock was felt at about 3:30 o'clock Monday afternoon, and, as in the San Francisco and Valparaiso disasters, flames immediately sprang from the wreckage to carry on the work of destruction.

Supplies For Sufferers. New York, Jan. 18.—The first cargo of supplies to be sent from New York in aid of the stricken people of Jamaica will be shipped today on the Hamburg-American steamer Allegheny.

American Consul's Dispatch. Washington, Jan. 17.—The following cablegram was received at the state department from Jamaica: "Secretary of State, Washington: Fearful earthquake, followed by fire. Kingston destroyed. Hundreds of lives lost. Food badly wanted. Consulate probably destroyed. Fireproof safe. American Consul."

Thousands Killed. Kingston, Jan. 18.—The disaster here is as great as the calamities of San Francisco and Valparaiso. Thousands of persons have been killed and the dead bodies are being taken from the debris by hundreds.

Fire in Printing Office. Salem, O., Jan. 14.—About \$10,000 damage was done by fire to the newspaper and job printing plants of the Salem Publishing company and the Tatem Label company, occupying a three-story building here.

Standard Oil Tax in Philippines. Manila, Jan. 18.—The insular government demands payment of the Standard Oil company of \$19,514 in gold duty on oil brought into the Philippine islands prior to 1901, on which the proper tax was not paid.

Armed Posse Places Feudist John Smith Under Arrest. Jackson, Ky., Jan. 16.—John Smith was arrested in Perry county by Harvey Riley on a warrant from Lee county. Smith was accompanied by an armed posse and was making his escape, but he offered no resistance.

Argument in Carnes Case. Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 17.—The full bench of the court of appeals heard oral argument in the writ of prohibition case against Special Judge Carnes of Breathitt county.

Trial Will Be Deferred. Covington, Ky., Jan. 18.—Judge W. S. Carnes of Williamstown will adjourn his special term of circuit court called to try Judge James Hargis, Elbert Hargis, William Britton, John Smith and John Abner, for the assassination of Dr. B. D. Cox.
