## FIFTEEN LODGES REPRESENTED

At Meeting of County Union, A. S. of E., Monday--Resolutions Passed.

The Breckenridge county union A. S. of E., met at Hardinsburg Monday. M. Shrewsbury, president, called the meeting to order and made a short address.

There were fifteen local lodges represented by delegates. On motion the president appointed the following committee on resolutions: W. R. Pierce, Lon Jarboe, C. E. Robbins, J. L. Jordan and Mike Miller.

The committee reported the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted.

Resolved, 1st, That the Breckenridge county union A. S. of E., ignore and condemn the action taken by the Independent Tobacco Growers Association recently organized in Breckenridge county.

2nd, That this county union appoint committees to fill the vacancies caused by some of the present committees going with the Independent Association, and said committee to have the power to fill all vacancies that may occur hereafter.

3d, That this county union recommend that steps be taken to build an equity warehouse at Hardinsburg for the purpose of pooling and handling tobacco.

4th, That this county union stand by and conform to the constitution and by laws of the American Society of Equity regardless of the action of any independent movement.
