Applying for Schools.

For the accommodation of teachers and school people generally, the following table of trustees is published. Already am I questioned about trustees, as the applicant often wishes not only to file application with the secretary, but also to let the other members of the Division know of his application. I suppose that no teacher wanting a particular school will fail to let the local trustee of that district know of his want. Of course he will secure the support of the local trustee if he really expects to be voted the school when the Division Board meets. I append a few sentence paragraphs from the school law:

All applications for positions in schools shall be filed with the Secretary of the Division Board of the educational division on which the school position is sought.

A majority of the members of such Division Board shall be necessary to the election of any teacher in any sub-district.

The Division Board in each educational division shall meet for the consideration of applications and the election of teachers on the last Saturday of June of each year.

The Division Board may meet on the last Saturday of July and August in each year for the purpose of filling any vacancies which may exist.

The Division Board may meet at such other times as the chairman may designate.
