

This day came H. G. Vessells and moved the court, the motion being seconded by justice Bates, that they levy in Breckinridge county, Kentucky, for the year, 1909, be 18 cents on the \$100 in value of taxable property divided into three funds, to-wit: General expense fund which shall include salaries of officers and all other current expenses, 7 cents; Sinking fund, 5 cents and Pauper fund, 6 cents. And each tax so levied shall not be diverted to any other purpose than that for which it was so levied, except as provided by law. And further that there be levied a per capita or poll tax on each male citizen of the age of 21 years or over, resident in the county aforesaid of \$1.50 for said year, 1909, and said poll tax to be levied and apportioned for the following purposes, to-wit: For road purposes 50 cents and for General expense fund \$1. And the said tax of 50 cents shall be devoted to work upon and expense of working public highways in the districts in which it is collected. And further that the levy for Road and bridge purposes be and remain in the amount as heretofore levied, to-wit: 25 cents on the \$100 in value of taxable property but divided as follows: 10 cents for roads and 15 cents for bridges, it being the purpose of the court to meet the heavy damage to bridges occasioned by high waters without raising the tax rate. And further that the tax collected from property situated in each magisterial district of the county shall be allotted to each district in which it is collected and the same shall be applied to the roads and culverts in each district; but the tax allotted to bridges shall be expended when same is necessary in the discretion of the authorities expending this fund. And further, that all persons who are required by law to work upon the public highways, work four days in the year, 1909, but no more than two days in any one week, except in case of unusual emergencies, when they may be required to work any number of days in the week or year to meet such emergencies. And that all overseers require the road hands in their respective districts to comply with this order as required by law. And further, that the county clerk furnish to the Road Supervisor a list of the delinquents of each magisterial district and that said Supervisor compel the said delinquents to work out their taxes on the public roads as provided by law.  
And a yea and nay vote being required thereon, the same was taken and resulted as follows:  
John O'Reilly, yea, C. H. Drury, yea, T. M. Bates, yea, J. T. McCamish, yea, H. G. Vessells, yea, Frank Ruppert, yea.  
Whereupon the motion as voted upon having carried, is made the order of this court, and the levies are so made.  
It is ordered by the court that the Public Improvement committee be and the same is hereby retained with the powers heretofore delegated to it. It is further ordered that provisions heretofore made for procuring available means for urgent demands, remain in force and effect.  
Ordered that court adjourn until tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.  
At a Fiscal Court continued and held in and for Breckinridge county, at the Court House in Hardinsburg, Kentucky, on Thursday, April 8 1909.  
Present, Hon. H. DeH. Moorman, presiding Judge of the Breckinridge County Court, and the following named justices of the peace viz: John O'Reilly, T. M. Bates, H. G. Vessells, J. T. McCamish and Frank Ruppert, being all the justices of peace in commission, save one.  
It is ordered by the court in the matter of the Tate Mill Bridge, that the old bridge with such new parts as are necessary be erected on the abutments as they now stand; and that said bridge be

anchored when so constructed.  
In pursuance of an order of the Breckinridge Circuit court, in the case of Green and others On Petition for a new road, it is hereby ordered that W. E. Rhodes be and he is allowed the sum of \$750 for right of way for new road through his farm \$750.  
And Gus Brown, the county attorney, is directed to pay the said Rhodes the sum of \$100 given by the petitioners, making \$850 the total damages allowed by the viewers, county court and circuit court. And W. H. Jarboe is now allowed the sum of \$50 and Mrs. H. M. Wilson is allowed \$10 as by orders in the county court.  
This day came justices Ruppert and Vessells a committee appointed to report on the condition of the public property and file a written report as follows:  
"We visited the county poorhouse and find same clean and well kept and the inmates properly cared for; the jail is in good condition, except that it needs a new fence; the county barn and county mules are in good condition and we would like to see the town of Hardinsburg comply with its contract to give a proper means of entering the county property, especially the public privy as the town uses it more than the county; we find courthouse cleaner than ever before and in good condition, except some leaks in the roof, and the yard is a credit to our county. Respectfully submitted.  
F. C. Ruppert, H. G. Vessells, committee."  
This day came the committee appointed to examine the claim of Milt Miller, sheriff, amounting to \$518 and report that the same is correct and should be allowed; and, upon motion the same claim is now allowed.  
This day came justices O'Reilly and Ruppert a committee of this court appointed to examine the report of the commissioners of the Railroad Tax district and report that they find the same correct and satisfactory; and said report is ordered to record and is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

Your commissioner further respectfully reports. That there is now outstanding 46 bonds of \$1,000 each, and that the interest has been paid on same to January 1, 1909. Very respectfully submitted,

This day came the commissioners and Fiscal Court committee appointed to examine into the financial and other conditions of Breckinridge county and to make a settlement with the sheriff and to check up accounts of the Supervisor of Roads, and file their report which is ordered to record and is as follows: "We, John O'Reilly and T. M. Bates, Fiscal Court Committee, and Morris H. Beard and W. F. Hook, commissioners appointed by the Fiscal court to settle with the sheriff of Breckinridge county for the year 1908, and to examine and check up the Supervisor's record of Road Money's for said year, and to report on the general financial and other conditions that they may deem proper to consider concerning the conduct of the county's affairs, report as follows: We carefully checked up the sheriff's settlement as prepared by the county clerk, item by item, and find same correct and accurate in each and every respect. We find same full and complete, the best settlement ever made in this court. We carefully examine the Su-

pervisor's record of road and bridge disbursements, comparing the record and the vouchers issued and find the accounts and records of this official's office in proper condition. We find that it had been necessary to spend quite a good deal of money in the erection and repair of bridges damaged by the excessive rainfall or high water and will be necessary to immediately expend more. But, as the court is managing the matter, the indebtedness thus created will be met without increasing the tax rate—as it was thought would be necessary. The court levied the school tax, as directed by the Attorney General and recommended by the County Board of Education, under the new law. We find the county's affairs generally, in the matters we have examined in regular and proper condition—there being many evidences of improvement in system and other conditions. All of which is respectfully reported.  
W. F. Hook, M. H. Beard, Commissioners for 1908 taxes or 1909 settlement with sheriff B. C.  
Thos. M. Bates, J. O'Reilly Committee of Fiscal Court.  
This day came Dr. R. H. McMullen and presented a claim for medicine amounting to \$8, furnished indigent family, which claim was rejected by the court.  
It is ordered by the court that the county attorney be and is hereby directed to take the necessary action to prevent horses and cattle running loose on the county property in violation of the city ordinance.  
This day came W. V. D. nt and presented a claim for one sheep killed and two injured, which claim was deferred.  
This day came Shelby Bandy and presented for allowance, a claim for two sheep killed, amounting to \$10, which was rejected for the reason that there was no proof that the sheep were killed by dogs.  
It appearing from the sheriff's settlement that there remains a balance due the General Expense fund of \$221.74, the sheriff is directed to pay said amount to the Commissioner and Receiver. And it appearing that there is \$127.89 due the Pauper fund, he will also pay this amount to the Commissioner and Receiver, and both of said amounts shall be placed to the credit of the General or Emergency fund.  
It appearing from said settlement that the sinking fund is intact in the sum of \$9,123.45, the sheriff will pay said amount to said commissioner and receiver, who will credit it on the county's outstanding indebtedness. And it further appearing that there is \$1,879.44 due the R. R. tax district, the sheriff will pay to the Railroad Commissioner the said sum, and said commissioner is directed to retire bonds with such money.  
It also appearing that the said settlement shows that there is due the First district 74 cents; the Second district, \$35.73; the third district being overpaid in the sum of \$5.52; the balance in the fourth district, \$156.27; the fifth district, \$62.99; and the sixth district, \$52.22, and the Road and Bridge fund, \$109.83, which amounts are ordered to remain in the hands of the sheriff subject to the order of the Supervisor of Roads and Bridges.  
And the said settlement of the sheriff for 1908 taxes, having been examined by the commissioners appointed to settle with the sheriff and by the Fiscal Court, and being in due form and correct, and receiving the approval of the court, the same is now confirmed and ordered to record in the sheriff's settlement book.  
The Special Commissioner of this court, Morris H. Beard, in pursuance of an order of this court, having advertised in the county papers and collected together old road orders and county claims created prior to 1906, in the sum of \$1,441.77, his acts in the premises are approved and he is now discharged as such commissioner. And the Commissioner and Receiver of Breckinridge county will take up the obligation issued by said M. H. Beard by issuing a bond for such sum and accumulated interest, and he will charge same in his report to be hereafter made.
