An interesting experiment for the purpose of creating immunity against tuberculosis is being tried in Pittsburgh under the direction of the Tuberculosis league of that city. Dr. William Charles White, medical director of the league, says it will probably take ten years before definite results of the work will be appreciated. The experiment is being conducted on the theory that much, if not all, tuberculosis infection begins in childhood. In view of this fact, the league is aiming to supervise the growth of every baby born for the next ten years in the South side district of Pittsburgh. The babies and their mothers will be taken in charge at the birth of the infant, and everything possible will be done to increase the resisting power of the child to disease and to make it thereby immune to tuberculosis infection. The theory of the society is that by fortifying the body in the earliest period of a child's life, the infant will, in most cases, become immune to the diseases with which heredity and environment may threaten it.

His Playmate Was a Canary. Various are the alleviations of which the patients at the Royal Hospital for Incurables avail themselves, says the London Telegraph. A number of pet birds are caged for the interest and entertainment of those no less unwilling prisoners of incurable disease. Among these pets there was a cock canary, the loss of which has been mourned by all who were acquainted with its remarkable intelligence and its many amusing and attractive qualities. For years it was set free in a large room, where it would fly about in perfect confidence. To its owner in particular it was so responsive that it would return again and again, regarding the performance as a sort of game; it would also allow itself to be freely handled, and delighted in a prolonged tussel upon a table, or a chase round a ball of paper. It listened to its owner's remarks with the closest attention and appeared to understand in a wonderful manner what was expected of it.

Doctor Russell—Forgive me, my dazling young general, for mentioning that you are a pig-headed ignoramus and don't know what you are talking about.—Manchester Guardian."

Subscribe today. Suffrage Conditions in Belgium. The Belgians must have grown weary of the "college man in politics." A Belgian who is a graduate of a university, or holds a diploma from one of the great technical schools, has two "supplementary votes." This is a grievance to the Belgian masses, who insist on manhood suffrage. The special privilege of the learned is only one of the many peculiarities of the Belgian system, as the family man has two votes to the bachelor's one, and there are property qualifications besides. If the proposed social strike for manhood suffrage, only one vote per voter, is carried into operation Belgium may present scenes worthy of its stormy past. The Belgians have a genius for organizing disorder. Twenty years ago when they compelled a broadening of the suffrage, it was noted that the rioters were singularly well handled and fought with an intelligence that puzzled the military. The explanation was that the rioters were disciplined and directed by "servists" who instead of "joining the colors," joined the revolt.
