

CORN DISTILLERY SLOP AN EXCELLENT HOG FEED---A NEW ERA FOR KENTUCKY HOG MEN.

No time in the history of our country has the raising and feeding of hogs been more profitable than during the past five years, and with the European war on conditions will remain equally as good, with every indication for improvement. The belligerent countries will have to look to America for large supplies of meat needed to feed their population, as their former fields of supply are practically closing or becoming exhausted.

Wonderful possibilities await the stockmen of Kentucky, where it has been practically demonstrated that hogs can be fattened and profitably fed on settled slop. The ravages of hog cholera can be eliminated by reason of the serum treatment.

Messrs. James and Breckler, analytical chemists, Louisville, Ky., have completed an examination of our concentrated settled slop and report as follows:

Protein.....1.51%
Oil.....0.69%
Per barrel of 50 gallons this gives a net amount of

Protein.....6.75 lbs.
Oil.....2.52 lbs.

Total.....9.28 lbs.
The average amount of protein and

oil in a bushel of corn is as follows: (U. S. Bureau of Chemistry, Department of Agriculture, Bul. 120):

Protein.....5.42 lbs.
Oil.....2.46 lbs.

Total.....7.88 lbs.

According to the above, it can be seen that one barrel of concentrated slop is equal to 1.21 bushels of corn, so far as the valuable feeding constituents of the corn are concerned. In addition the fact must not be lost sight of that this feeding value is in the form of very fine particles, and thoroughly cooked, so that the digestibility is closer to 100% than the ordinary figure for these constituents. In the raw corn the losses from imperfect mastication are enormous, droppings from cattle containing so much feed value on a corn diet that hogs may be fed on them. Here even, with no mastication, the food is all available. In addition it may be stated that considerable of the energy supplied by corn is used in its mastication, which is not required in this case.

This feed contains over 1% of lactic acid, which is valuable for an intestinal antiseptic.—Adv.

LOOK UPON KOENIG'S ARREST AS IMPORTANT

Other German Plotters to Be Taken.

New York, Dec. 20.—The importance that is attached by the federal authorities to the arrest of Paul Koenig, regarded by them as the head of the German secret service in this country, was indicated by the confidence with which they asserted their belief that most of the accidents and fires in ammunition plants and on board ships would cease.

They felt that Koenig has been so all-important in the German plans that with his removal the work of the machine must break down. And they felt that with the evidence found in the notebook they can round up most of the persons who have been involved in the country-wide conspiracies.

They have learned for one thing that Koenig employed twenty-five to thirty people on salaries averaging \$20 a week since the war began. Besides these men there are constant references to others, and it is predicted that at least thirty-five more men will be arrested within a short time.

There is much elation among federal officials over the arrest of Koenig. They regard him as one of the cleverest men they have ever had to do with, and said that he boasted that he would never be caught. His ability to cover his tracks was such that, although they have known of his activities for a long time it was not until a few days ago that they felt evidence had been secured to warrant his arrest.

THREE KILLED AT CROSSING

Jitney Buss Struck by Pennsylvania Freight Train.

Pittsburg, Dec. 20.—Struck by a Pennsylvania railroad freight train at a grade crossing in West Apollo, while riding in a jitney bus, George Horne, a steel roller; Clifford McConnell, a farmer; Robert Milron, a mill worker, and W. H. George, driver and owner of the bus, were killed.

Robert Trautman and Herbert Horne, a son of George Horne, received injuries from which they will die.

Henry Gowden received serious hurts. All the victims were on their way from Apollo to their homes in Vandergrift when the accident occurred. George Horne and McConnell were buried beneath wreckage and were dead when removed.

GERMAN VESSELS ARE SUNK

Cruiser and Torpedo Boat Destroyed by a Submarine.

Berlin (via Amsterdam and London), Dec. 20.—The following official statement was issued here:

"The small cruiser Berwin, and an accompanying torpedo boat have been sunk by a submarine in the eastern Baltic. A considerable portion of the crews are safe."

The German cruiser Berwin is one of a group of five vessels of the same class laid down in 1902 and 1903 and completed two years later.

Death of Mrs. Morton.

Mrs. Chas. Morton died at her home on the hill November 28 of tuberculosis. She was twenty seven years old and left a husband, three children, one sister and three brothers. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Powell at the residence, the interment was in the Cloverport cemetery.

MURDERED BY BLOW OF AX

Children, Upon Returning Home, Find Mother's Dead Body.

Letchfield, Ky. (Special): Stretched upon the floor of her home near Clarkson, her head resting on rug and two wounds in her forehead, the body of Mrs. Bina Pearl, sixty-five years old, was found by her children returning from church. In the yard was a blood-stained ax. Her husband, Joseph Pearl, sixty-seven years old, is in jail charged with murder.

A jury impaneled by Coroner W. R. Shartzer returned a verdict that Mrs. Pearl had come to her death at the hands of the husband, who, it is said, confessed.

"I don't know why I did it," he said.

Pearl had twice been an inmate of a state insane asylum, having been dismissed the last time only two weeks ago, after being treated eight months.

PLAN FRANCHISE SUIT

L. & N. and C. & O. Will Contest Tax Assessments.

Frankfort, Ky. (Special): For the fourth consecutive year suits will be brought in the federal court here by railroads to enjoin the collection of taxes on what they consider excessive franchise assessments.

The Louisville & Nashville and Chesapeake & Ohio laid the ground for suits by paying to the state auditor taxes on what they consider a fair valuation of their franchises and will sue to enjoin the collection on the balance and to enjoin the certification of it to taxing districts.

These two companies and the Illinois Central and Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific were raised from 300 to 900 per cent. in 1912, and the raises for the three years preceding this are now in litigation in the federal court.
