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MEN NAMED AT CHICAGO PLEASE G.O.P.

Hughes and Fairbanks Nominated.

ONLY THREE BALLOTS.

Platform For Americanism and Preparedness.

FAVORITE SONS WITHDRAW.

Governor Whitman's Speech Nominating Charles Evans Hughes. Sketches of the Candidates For President and Vice President. Mr. Hughes' Letter of Acceptance.

Chicago, June 10. — Charles Evans Hughes of New York for president and Charles Warren Fairbanks of Indiana for vice president, the men nominated by the Republican convention here, are greeted with approval by party members throughout the country. Each man has held high office, the former as governor of New York and associate justice of the United States supreme court and the latter as senator from Indiana and vice president of the United States. The latter held his former high office in the second administration of President Roosevelt, from 1905 to 1909.

From the time the first ballot was cast in the Republican convention and it was seen that Hughes had more votes than any of his rivals his selection was freely predicted. The end of the heated but not unduly prolonged fight came on the third ballot, when the New York man was chosen by a vote of 949 1/2, 494 being necessary for a choice.

Twenty Candidates Voted For. He had obtained 253 1/2 votes on the first ballot, taken in the evening of June 9, and on the second ballot, taken immediately thereafter, he gained 75, while Theodore Roosevelt, who had been feared by the Hughes men as his

strongest opponent, mounted from 65 to 81. Besides these two, eighteen other candidates received votes on the second ballot, the total, twenty, being greater probably than ever before known in a national convention. Root, Burton, Cummins, Weeks and Fairbanks were the strongest of the twen-

PASSENGER TRAIN CARRYING DELEGATES

To the Democratic National Convention at St. Louis, Wrecked in Owensboro Early Tuesday Morning.

ONE PASSENGER HURT.

The Louisville, Henderson and St. Louis passenger train No. 145, carrying the Kentucky delegates to the Democratic National Convention at St. Louis, was wrecked at 1:30 o'clock Tuesday morning two blocks from the union station at Owensboro.

Three rear sleepers of the train left the track, the Hapsburg, the next to the last of the coaches, was overturned. Every berth in this coach was occupied.

Mayor John H. Buschmeyer, of Louisville, who was sleeping in an upper berth, was thrown violently against an opposite berth. He was badly bruised, but not seriously injured. None of the passengers were badly injured.

The speed of the train at the time of the accident was not more than twenty miles an hour. This is probably the reason why a large number of the passengers were not injured.

The passengers, who were in the derailed coaches, boarded the day coaches and continued the trip to Evansville, where sleepers were provided for them.
