Distilleries to Close on Sept. 8.

The distilling of whisky will come to an end in Kentucky at 11 o'clock on the night of September 8, according to a decree which went forth from the office of the Food Administration in Washington Friday night. The food bill was approved August 10, and will become effective within 30 days which will be midnight, September 9. This is Sunday, and the revenue laws prohibit the operation of distilleries from 11 o'clock Saturday night to 1 o'clock Monday morning. This will make it necessary for the distilleries to close finally Saturday night, September 8.

Bibles in Demand.

New York, August 22.—With publishers falling daily further behind in their orders, the war has created the greatest demand in the history of the nation for Bibles. Publishers say that anyone who possesses a set of electrotype plates for the New Testament, pocket size, owns something almost as valuable as a steamship. Many of the publishers report their presses running from fifteen to eighteen hours a day, but they are still several weeks behind orders already received.
