PROTECT THE BALLOT.

Mountaineers Should Make Systematic and Determined Effort.
The Goebel leaders have been making the Republican strength in the Eleventh district for several years. Since the election of 1896 they have added to the district Jackson, which in 1896 gave McKinley a majority of 1,328 and Bailey a majority of 1,072; Cumberland, with a Republican majority of 500, and Monroe, with a Republican majority of 800. Calculating the majority, therefore, of the Eleventh district, one must add the majorities in Jackson, Cumberland and Monroe, aggregating 2,500.

Mr. Goebel, in his campaign, has sought to vindicate his force bill by a general assault upon the election returns of the entire Eleventh district. In one instance he descended into particular and declared that Mr. Colston, candidate for congress, served as an election officer in one of the precincts, and he made other accusations, which the people of the Eleventh district should long remember.

Mr. Goebel and his bugles have been making a tour of the mountain districts, not with the idea that he can convert any Republicans or win back any of the disaffected Democrats, but merely through his organs to assert that he had made great gains; this assertion standing as the explanation of the "returns," which are to come in the night of the election showing large Republican losses in the Eleventh district.

The Evening Post calls the attention of the Eleventh district to this condition of affairs now, that the people may unite with the citizens of the rest of the state in a determination to vindicate their right to suffrage and to stand with their fellow citizens everywhere in defense of the ballot box. There should be no rest from this time forth in any of the mountain counties; systematic and determined efforts should be made to bring out a full vote and to secure a fair count.

Nothing is so easy in the mountains; the distances are great and the roads are rough, but the people of that district love liberty, value above all else the right of suffrage, and should be willing to devote their time and attention for one month to the maintenance of the ballot and the destruction of Goebellism. — Louisville Evening Post.

AGAIN KNOCKED GOLD!

More Light on the Double Dealing of Goebel.

HIS NOTE TO CAPTAIN HEADLEY.

Crushing and Most Conclusive Evidence of the Drapable Duplicity and Astonishing Audacity of the Brazen Kisser—His Reputation and Political Future Destroyed.

The Evening Post publishes, more with a sense of humiliation than any feeling of triumph, a remarkable letter dated May 3, 1896, addressed to Captain John W. Headley of Louisville, Ky. The publication of this letter is due to the confession and apology made by Mr. Goebel in his speech at Hartford.

After taking his own time and choosing his own place to respond to Mr. Carlisle Mr. Goebel constructed one of the crudest pieces of political fiction that any man credited with ordinary intelligence ever offered to the people of Kentucky.

The Evening Post recently published a letter written by Mr. Goebel, May 23, 1896, to Mr. John G. Carlisle. At the same time we published a statement from Mr. Carlisle concerning that letter. It was clearly shown by Mr. Goebel's letter that his position and the position of his committee in Kentucky county were in serious peril from attacks made upon him by Mr. Harvey Myers. Mr. Goebel had gone to Washington to seek the assistance of Mr. Carlisle in this struggle with Mr. Harvey Myers. He had pointed out to Mr. Carlisle the fact that Harvey Myers and his delegation stood for "silver, blackbird and hardin"; that he, Mr. Goebel, stood for Carlisle and Carlisle's policies, and that the only way to secure the Carlisle delegations to the state convention and Carlisle delegates to the national convention was for Mr. Carlisle to use his influence with the members of the state central committee to secure the continued recognition of Mr. Goebel by the central committee.

At Hartford Mr. Goebel denied that he had asked Mr. Carlisle's assistance and denied further that there was any necessity for seeking the assistance of anybody, and pointed to the credentials given him and his committee in October, 1894, as proof conclusive of his position.

Now, the truth is that those credentials of October constituted the evidence Mr. Goebel gave to Mr. Carlisle of the genuineness of his title, which was being assailed, and he refers to these credentials in his letter of May 20, 1896.

But all quibbling, double dealing and doubt are swept aside by the publication of the letter of Mr. Goebel to Captain Headley, dated May 3, 1896—just 20 days previous to the letter to Mr. Carlisle. Let it be remembered that at this time Captain John W. Headley was an outspoken advocate of free silver, and that this letter was addressed to him in order to secure his personal influence as a friend and an advocate of free silver with certain members of the central committee.

In this letter Mr. Goebel sets forth the fact that there was at that time a combination made between Mr. Hodge and Mr. Myers to cancel the credentials given him in October, 1896, and to re-establish the Myers committee, known as the old committee, in place of the new or Goebel committee. With this statement of facts he appeals to Captain Headley for his assistance, assuring him that the matter vitally concerns his political future. It is a cry of distress; it is an appeal for help in desperate need. It is far more frank and outspoken than the letter to Mr. Carlisle. It reveals the condition of Mr. Goebel's mind. It sets forth the malevolence of Mr. Goebel's nature against any man who dares oppose him. The Hodge whom in this letter he denounces as a liar is the same Judge Hodge who came to the

It shows that Mr. Goebel deliberately, addressing an audience of Kentuckians, dared with astounding audacity to falsify the political records of his own party, written with his own hand, in the desperate hope that no letters remained to confute him.

It is not possible to make any comment to increase the force of this historical statement. We submit the matter to the people of Kentucky; we submit it to the associates of Mr. Goebel on the state ticket, whom he thoroughly dishonors. We submit it to Senator Blackburn, to Judge Pryor, to Robert J. Breckinridge, and ask if they are still willing to stand before the people of Kentucky as the personal and political indorser of Mr. William Goebel.—Louisville Evening Post.

A WORD TO KENTUCKIANS.

During the three days just past there has been much music and oratory in old Kentucky. Banners have floated in the breezes, bands have played and orators have talked. A special train has traversed the State, and its occupants have been received with great consideration by the people, regardless of party factional lines. Mr. Bryan has the respect of his enemies, and even his foes pity Blackburn. A campaign for the election of a Governor is the occasion of these demonstrations. Mr. William Goebel is a candidate for Governor, Mr. William J. Bryan a Presidential candidate, and Mr. J. C. S. Blackburn a candidate for the United States Senate. Naturally great honors are shown these men, because of the high positions they occupy.

Wherever there are flying banners, music, oratory and the applause of multitudes there is much to attract and thrill. While the partisans of a candidate give vent to their enthusiasm and press forward in their determination to make him Governor of this great State there are other scenes that call for the attention of Kentuckians; scenes more powerful to stir the nobler parts of men's nature than all the oratory that ever fell from human lips, than all the music of this earth, than all the pomp of parades and the applause of nations.

Kentuckians, turn for a moment from the devices of the demagogue, the appeals to passion and prejudice, the demonstrations that would drive men before the force of numbers, and look upon some other pictures—the happy home of a gentleman, a husband and father—behold the silms of slander, hear the fatal shot of the vulgar assailant of private character; look again into the once happy home and see the grief-stricken widow and orphan, and again, the remnants of a family union are scattered, and, again, the cloud of gloom and grief settling over that household has shut out the light of reason from a human mind.

Go from the vacant, silent halls of that home to a State institution, and behold the living death of vile slanders and, with brazen effrontery, asked Kentuckians to make him Governor of the State, is he who wrote and published the brutal assault upon John L. Sandford's character; who fired the shot that killed Sandford, and sent the mother of his children to a State institution for the insane. The day that William Goebel securely fastened his claws upon the throat of the Kentucky Democracy the wife of his victim was committed to the Lexington asylum. Is there a Kentuckian who has a mother, a sister, a wife or a daughter, who can forget these things as Goebel parades himself over the State and set merely asks for but threatens to take by force and fraud the highest office in the Commonwealth? Is there a Kentuckian who can remember these things and vote for Goebel without banging his head in shame? What husband, if he has the manhood, the chivalry of a gentleman, can look into the innocent and trusting face of his wife and tell her that he voted to elevate to the gubernatorial chair the man whose vile obscenity in the public press sent Sandford to his grave and Sandford's wife to an asylum for the insane? Will the fathers of Kentucky's fair women forget Sandford's wife and their own daughters, and make this home-destroyer Governor of this State?

There is a sentiment or a prejudice that binds men to their party associations, but there is a higher, a holier, a more sacred sentiment binding men to those relations that form the basis of civilization, that ties men to home

and family. Is there a Kentuckian who would dare suggest that the sentiment of love for home and respect for womanhood be sacrificed in the worship of the fabled party regularity? Have Kentuckians forgotten the traditions of their fathers? Will they permit partisan and factional prejudice to stifle their noblest instincts? What, in the name of Kentucky's honor, is the fascination of a monstrosity in politics that would make men forget they were born of women? Where is the man who can face the women of the State and declare that he is ready to put into the hands that slandered Sandford and then slew him, the institution of which his unfortunate widow is an inmate? Does not all sense of decency, all idea of virtue, and the voice of Kentucky manhood cry out against such an outrage?—Louisville Dispatch.

HOSTILE TO PROGRESS.
Goebel and His Platform Would Drive Capital From the State.
Mr. William Goebel and his campaign managers have confined themselves during the summer to an assault upon one corporation. They have made their campaign a crusade against progress. They have attempted to intimidate capital, and thus to oppress labor; and to proclaim their purpose, if successful, to break down an institution that is doing most for the development of the state's resources.

Such a campaign does not simply impair the power of the road attacked to develop the state, but it opens out of the state capital needed to open our mines, develop our forests, build furnaces and add to the wealth of the community.

Just before the panic in 1893 there had been considerable development in eastern Kentucky; coal and timber lands were sold and developed; railroads were built and many counties that had been pauper counties from their organization became revenue-producing counties. During the panic all this development ceased; men who had invested large sums of money in eastern Kentucky, and who reside in other portions of the state, and the people who inhabit those regions themselves were discouraged; values declined and further investments ceased. But during the past year there has been considerable change; there has been great activity in all kinds of mountain property; the lumber regions of Michigan are giving out and hundreds of thousands of dollars of capital have been invested in the purchase of lumber in eastern Kentucky. Large sums have been invested in coal lands; several railroads are projected through that section. Recently a contract to construct a railroad from Jackson into the coal and timber regions of Kentucky was let. Everybody in eastern Kentucky who has property, and those away from it who have money invested there, are hopeful of the future. They know that in order to develop that section, increase values and put the troopers of that section in the markets, the extension of railroads is absolutely necessary.

Mr. Goebel and his platform are hostile to the railroads and to all progress, and if elected his administration would greatly retard, if it did not stop, the construction of railroads and check the tiding of property all over the state, and especially in that region. The representatives of capitalists are daily sending their agents through this section, and are in correspondence with the people in reference to its development.

In addition, therefore, to the interest of Kentuckians generally have in the defeat of Mr. Goebel, the people of eastern Kentucky have a direct and personal interest in his defeat. With the downfall of the Goebel machine, with the overthrow of all that it stands for, a new era of progress and prosperity would begin, as well as a new era and a better era in Kentucky politics. Men of eastern Kentucky, do you stand ready to do your duty?—Louisville Evening Post.
