Importers, since the time when the memory of Americans runneth not to the contrary, have tried to discredit domestic articles and exalt the merits of those of foreign origin. It is even on record that some of them, privately admitting the excellence of American goods, have insisted on falsely labeling them as foreign productions as a condition of offering for sale. There are few, if any, forms of misrepresentation which American goods have not been up against at home or abroad. Yet they have eventually won their way on their merits.—Troy Times.
