Radford preached to large congregations at the Christian church last Sunday morning and evening. J. Lusky, of Nashville, bought the remnant of the Mendel stock from the Sheriff Friday and the goods have been shipped to Nashville. The consideration was \$1,450. C. Shanahan, boot and shoe maker, formerly of this city, purchased property in Clarksville some time since and is doing a good business having opened a grocery in connection with his shop. James Moss, col., will be tried today before Judge Winfree on two charges, a breach of the peace and carrying a concealed deadly weapon. He was arrested near Newstead Friday and placed in jail. I. B. Atkew has been elected Police Judge of Cadiz, J. E. Baker town marshal, and M. S. Thompson, Jas. G. Johnson, J. W. Crenshaw, H. B. Wilkerson and T. T. Watson, town trustees. H. J. C. Schofield, of Evansville, successfully moved the large frame building on the corner of Ninth and Campbell streets, property of Mr. Ross Rogers, to the corner of Sixteenth and Campbell last week. We heard a wheat speculator say last Saturday evening that the new crop of wheat would open at 60 or 65 cents. He also said that though not of the finest quality, the present crop would be the largest ever raised in the county. The firm of Cooper & Casler, consisting of James Cooper, and David Casler, has been dissolved by mutual consent, Mr. Casler retiring. Mr. Polk Casler purchased his interest and the firm name will remain Cooper & Casler. Some of our farmers cut their wheat last week, and several had made arrangements to commence yesterday, but the heavy rain storm Saturday night was altogether unexpected, and will no doubt delay the harvest for a short time. The Baptist Circle meeting at Concord church, a short distance north of town, last Sunday, was well attended from the city, but owing to the rise in the river persons living on the northern side were unable to be present. Rev. R. H. Buckley preached an excellent sermon. The work of lowering the grade of Ninth street from Virginia to the railroad has been progressing very satisfactorily, and when Superintendent Tryman gets through with it, it will be one of the prettiest streets of the city. Nothing to speak of has yet been done on Seventh street but a full force will soon be put on it. Saturday night's rain was the heaviest that has fallen for three years. It is thought to be general over this section of the State. The wind did some damage to small trees and corn and wheat were blown down. At least three inches of rain fell, accompanied by some hail. The river rose considerably higher than it has been for about three years. Last Sunday was Children's Day at the First and Cumberland Presbyterian churches. The services in the morning at the First church were very interesting and largely attended. The Cumberland held no morning services and attended the First Church in a body. The First Church attended the exercises in the afternoon at the Cumberland. These exercises were also highly interesting and the house was filled to overflowing. Collections were taken up at both the services, to be sent to the two boards of Sunday school work. The citizens of North Main are exceedingly anxious to have street lamps put up north of the bridge. One enterprising citizen, after getting the Council to put up an oil lamp about a year ago, has been regularly burning it at his own expense. The main gas pipe was laid down no further than the bridge when the contract with the Gas Company was first entered into by the city. Why it was stopped there no one can guess, as it could have been anchored to the masonry at considerably less cost than putting under ground. A petition from the citizens will probably be laid before the Council, asking it to finish the lights on North Main.
