CREAM OF NEWS.

A Small Burglary. Sunday night Judge H. B. Littell's law office was burglarized and some small change lost. The burglars entered through a front window and securing a hatchet pried open the door to the official desk, then securing the smallest drawer departed leaving a large safe and other valuables un molested. Monday during the day Mr. Tom Dalton, while on the river bank a few hundred yards below Seventh street bridge, discovered the drawer lying upon a flat rock where it had been left by the burglars and returned it to the judge. Nothing but the money, a few dollars, had been taken, and in the darkness they had failed to find a nickel and a copper which was left in the box.

An Ancient Coin. While a little son of Mr. W. E. Adcock, of Church Hill, was digging into a nest of humble-bees on his farm he unearthed a Spanish dollar 100 years old. The place was near the root of a stump upon the edge of a sink-hole and the coin came up with the roots of a bunch of weeds pulled up. It is almost as bright as when new, though it is just a century old and had been buried for perhaps the greater part of that time. On one side was the Spanish coat of arms and the words "HISPANIA. ET. IND. 1676. M. S. F. M." On the other side was a cast of the King's profile, surrounded by the words "CAROLUS IV DEI GRATIA, 1789."

The following delegates from the two lodges at Hopkinsville were in attendance: From Solomon's Temple, No. 27, Rev. Jas. L. Alenworth and James Thomas; Evening Star, No. 26, Mrs. Caroline Clardy, Mrs. Amanda Vaughn and I. H. Jones. After hearing the report of a good many committees and dispatching a good deal of business, the third day the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Moses Elkins, of Keene, Ky., State Grand Chief; Eliza Eblin, of Frankfort, Ky., Treasurer; Mrs. Mary A. Wallace, of Danville, Ky., State Grand Secretary; Gen. Morris T. Chester, of Louisville, Ky., State Grand Orator. Hopkinsville gets one of the high honors: Rev. Jas. L. Alenworth, State Grand Vice Chief. Mrs. Julia A. Arthur, of Louisville, assists to the Grand Chief. After the installation of the officers by Rev. C. C. Vaughn, Past State Grand Chief, of Russellville, the council adjourned to meet in Lexington on June 18, 1890.

A Colored Official. Jailor Geo. W. Long has appointed Kinsey Tyler, col., as deputy jailer and the oath of office was administered to him on the first of the present month. This is the first instance where a colored man has filled a position of this character. A colored man served one term as county coroner and a few of them have been elected constables, but it was left for a Democratic jailer to appoint the first colored man as a deputy. Tyler is a worthy and respectable representative of his race and will make a creditable and capable official.

The house was crowded and the sermon listened to with profound attention. It was a simple gospel sermon delivered withunction and earnestness. Bro. Prestridge is a man perhaps thirty-five, prematurely gray, of rather commanding appearance, easy manners and considerable social power. Already there have been nine additions to the church, eight by letter and one by experience. The church is united upon him, and we confidently predict a useful and prosperous pastorate. With God's blessing, the First Church of San Antonio, is destined to wield a potent influence in this city, which is almost completely under the power of a non-American and unchristian population."

A Hopkinsville Man Hurt. Mr. Hanson Penn Diltz, Hopkinsville correspondent of the Cincinnati Enquirer, Nashville American and other papers, was one of the parties seriously injured in the recent wreck at Batavia, Ohio. The Mayville Bulletin has this account: "Mr. Hanson Penn Diltz was badly injured in the railroad wreck near Batavia, O., last Friday. When found, Diltz was lying face down in a pool of water, and seemed to have either been killed or drowned. Some one carried him up the bank and laid him out for dead, but he soon regained consciousness. He was resting comfortably at last accounts at the home of his uncle in Batavia and it is thought he will recover."
