LETTER FROM CALIFORNIA.

SACRAMENTO, CAL., Nov. 20th—  
Your correspondent with three other Christian county people left your city on the night of the 15th for the Pacific slope. On the following morning we were in the Union depot at St. Louis, with a host of fellow-travelers. Partaking of a hasty breakfast, all hands were prepared to depart on the respective routes. The Chicago & Alton railroad passes through a portion of Illinois crossing the river at Alton and thence in a southerly direction to Kansas City. It has never been my fortune to pass through a more fertile and beautiful country; splendid farming lands for stock and grain, elegant country residences, and well-timbered towns lay on both sides of our route. Large herds of cattle were seen grazing on the blue grass lands of Missouri. Our first day's journey was across the great prairie of Missouri. Kansas City was reached at seven or eight o'clock that evening.

I was not prepared to realize the growth and prosperity of this western city since I was here in 1855. As a railroad center and commercial point, with the splendid streets of solidly built buildings, street railways and enterprising business men, it stands in the front ranks. At this place the Chicago & Alton joins the National Grande joined other representatives from the different states. One train carried all of the excursionists, over a hundred in number. Lunch baskets were carried generally by the party. The expenses of the trip were thereby lessened and comfort and pleasure increased. The company had a merry good time in partaking of the good cheer of breakfast, dinner and supper; occasionally a meal would be taken at the eating houses. After getting to Colorado the aspect of the country changes from the prairie to a more diversified and rugged country. In going up to Denver we encountered a snow storm, and in a climate corresponding to our Jan. and Feb. snow and ice hard enough to skate on. The Grange party were given a banquet at Denver and treated as distinguished guests. The weather was unfavorable for making a tour of the city. The next point of interest that we reached was Manitou, a beautiful mountain town lying in full view of Pike's Peak and nestled as it were in the embrace of the foot hills of the Rocky Mountains. The party were taken to a very fine drive to the Garden of the Gods. Grand and beautiful scenery characterizes this lovely place. It was a gratification to us all to see what will surely inspire the beholder with a feeling of the sublime. In less than a day we were again flying over the sterile plains of Colorado towards Salt Lake City. The excursion stopped over on Sunday in the city of the Saints. It is a crowded fact that few places in the world have the natural advantages of this far away city. Snow capped mountains surround it on all sides, and fertile plains stretch away in the distance. The streets are very wide and the laying off of the city in all of its appointments is on the largest scale. Very many elegant residences and beautiful grounds are to be found all over the place. At two o'clock in the afternoon the Mormon tabernacle was visited. I have never seen as commodious a church. A multitude of people, strangers, visitors and residents filled the immense structure. The music from the grand organ and choir was something not to be forgotten. A very interesting and successful preaching was far more orthodox than I was led to expect; excepting the allusion to Jos. Smith as an inspired man, the discourse was a vigorous and successful appeal.

Crossing the Rocky Mountains and going through the cañons cannot be adequately described. The beholder is filled with the emotions of the grand and sublime that it is impossible to paint in language or portray upon canvas. After getting well across the range of mountains our train passed through the arid and sandy plains of the American Desert. Nothing of vegetation is to be seen, but the prairie sage, as far as the eye can reach. A stop of one night at a mountain town, Reno, was made by two of the party. The mountain trout in the lakes adjacent. As a dish it cannot be surpassed in excellence. The run over the Sierra Nevada was made in daylight, and we had a good opportunity to see the wild and picturesque scenery of this region. Fine covered mountains, deep gorges and valleys with foaming falls were always in view. The great trains and engines are in comparison but the vast, lofty wooded mountains are a change of climate and scenery is experienced.

The heavy air, flowering plants and trees proclaim the fact that we are in the borders of the Golden State. Sacramento is situated in a favored country, finely adapted to the production of all the fruits and garden products for which the state is distinguished. The grounds surrounding the capital building are very ornamental and laid off and decorated more abundantly than any that I have ever seen. The National Grange closes today, and the party expects to start on a tour of the State.

For four days there has been constant rain, which may very much interfere with the progress of the party. The city abounds with every description of all the fruits and vegetables that are indigenous to the soil and climate. The freedom of the city, its museums, art galleries are thrown open to the visiting patrons and a right royal time are we having.

The Northern and New England States are generally represented in the National Grange. Much discussion has been indulged in but good feeling and harmony has characterized the meeting throughout. The most interesting place that I have visited in this city is the Truck or Gallery of paintings. The lover of the picture has a feast here, provided that can rarely be found. The grounds surrounding have all the rarest fruit bearing trees and

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
