THE CAT OUT.

Undoubted Evidence that the Democrats are Being Played for Suckers.

In its issue of Friday the KENTUCKIAN stated that the Christian county delegation to the Wheeler meeting at Henderson was composed principally of Republican politicians.

It now has the facts to back this assertion and upon the eyes of Democratic Wheelers. Three out-and-out Republicans, two scratchers and one Democrat were present as delegates.

Two of the Republicans were then and are now members of the Republican county committee. These gentlemen are Mr. J. A. Boyd and Mr. J. T. Walker, whose names appear elsewhere in this issue, in a list of members of the Republican committee.

At any rate we have the spectacle presented of members of the Republican committee representing Democratic Wheelers in a Wheeler meeting and nominating a Democratic Wheeler for Congress, at the same time that the committee of which they were newly chosen members in another county was trying to get a Republican candidate on the track to run against the Wheeler candidate.

This double-dealing could have been done with but one purpose in view—to divide the Democratic vote and let a straight, high-tariff, anti-slavery, force-bill Republican slip into Congress.

This has been the scheme Republican politicians in and out of the Wheel have been working on all summer. Various Democrats were approached and finally one was found whose vanity was tickled by the idea of being a candidate for Congress and he consented to become the tool of designing men.

We cannot believe that Democrats who joined the Wheelers' Union with the understanding that it was not a political machine, will be gulled into biting at this bait of Tom Reed Republicans who are playing them for suckers.

THE REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE.

A resolution was unanimously adopted, all of the districts being represented, recommending E. G. Sebree for Congress on the Republican ticket, after which the meeting adjourned.

Total for the district 415,807; in 1880 the population was 365,642, an increase of 50,165, or 13.72 per cent. Only two counties in the district show a decrease, viz: Ballard, 607, and Trigg 619. The population of the principal towns in this district is as follows: Hopkinsville, 6,457, increase 2,228, per cent. 52.68; Henderson, 8,830, increase 3,465, per cent. 61.59; Owensboro, 9,818, increase, 3,587, per cent. 57.57; Paducah, 13,024, increase, 4,988, per cent. 62.07.

OFFICIAL FIGURES.

They Show How Hopkinsville Has Dis-tanced Clarksville.

The official Census figures give Hopkinsville a population of 6,457, a gain of 2,228 or 57.68 per cent over the census of 1880. This is several hundred better than the first unofficial figures of the late very imperfect census led us to believe would be reported, but it is still many hundred short of our actual population. If the census had been taken with anything like the proper care and attention to duty, we would have shown at least 7,000 people in the city limits. If Hopkinsville had imitated Clarksville, and extended her boundaries two miles into the country, we could show not a population of 10,000. The official figures show Gainesville to have 600, Hubbardsville 150, Durrettstown 375 and the Asylum 675 people, to say nothing of smaller suburbs within half a mile of town. Hopkinsville's suburban population is not less than 50,000, which gives us for all business purposes a population of 9,457, while in similar territory Clarksville contains 7,800. In the old limits Clarksville shows a population of 4,500, a gain of only 600. It is a good thing for the poor old village that she neglected her suburbs. She would have made a poor showing without it this outside help.
