He is seventeen years of age and has for two years been in school at Marmaduke Military Academy at Sweet Springs, Mo. He is a brother to Sam Shackelford, Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate, and has another brother who is a merchant at Owensboro.—*Courier-Journal.*

A Saloon Burglarized.

Burglary at Crofton.  
Burglars entered the saloon of Mr. A. G. Bowling, at Crofton, last Friday night, and made way with a considerable quantity of liquor, several bar bottles and a lot of oysters and other eatables. They effected an entrance by prizing open a window. Mr. Bowling's loss will probably be \$50. There is no clue to the burglars.  
A College Burned.  
Cedar Bluff College, at Woodburn, near Franklin, Ky., burned last Thursday. It was partially covered by insurance. The school was established 30 years ago by W. F. Whitesides, but has lately been under the control of the Methodist church. There were about 80 boarding pupils, mostly young ladies from Arkansas, Texas and Tennessee. The school will not be continued this session.  
Another Lunatic Destroys Himself.  
John Youcum's death by hanging at the Asylum yesterday morning makes the second suicide there in ten days. One suicide nearly always suggests another at the Asylum, but it is sometimes that several years elapse between suicides. Youcum was a homicidal patient from Whitesville, Daviess county, and is the man whom the police of Owensboro and the constables of the county were unable to arrest for a long time, before he was committed to the Asylum. He never exhibited the slightest suicidal notion before. He was discovered in five minutes after he put the cord around his neck, which he fastened to his window sash and tightened it by leaning forward on it. His neck must have been broken, as it was impossible to restore him. He was cut down immediately.  
A Sugar Prize.  
Some days ago an enterprising Pembroke firm offered a prize of a barrel of granulated sugar to the person killing them the largest number of rabbits by 5 o'clock p. m., Saturday last. Messrs. Burrus and Chilton were promptly on hand with 304 rabbits and secured the prize. Messrs. P. B. Pendleton and J. H. Williams competed for the prize also, and killed 446 rabbits, but as the conditions called for the delivery by 5 o'clock, which they failed to do, it seems, however, that an extra barrel of sugar will be given them yet, as they delivered their game before the hour mentioned to a member of the firm who was in the country. A gun was given to Bob Burrus a few days before by the same firm, the number of rabbits killed being 535. The firm secured 1285 rabbits by the operation.
