Dwelling in Ashes.

Mr. John Sizemore, of the Cerulean Springs neighborhood, lost his house and contents by fire on the night of the 2d inst. Mr. Sizemore had no insurance and his loss is total.

Oswin Steinhagen's Leg Broken.

Oswin Steinhagen, oldest son of Prof. R. T. Steinhagen, of this city, fell from a cable car in St. Louis last week and broke one of his legs in three places. He is in a hospital and will be brought home as soon as he is able to travel.

Church Destroyed by Lightning.

During the rain storm last Thursday morning the colored Methodist church at Allensville was struck by lightning and burned to the ground in a few minutes. The building was a good one and the loss falls heavily upon the congregation.

Tobacco Barn Burned.

Mr. Joel McKimney, a prominent farmer living a few miles south of Calcedonia, had the misfortune to lose a large tobacco barn and contents by fire a few days ago. The fire originated in a cabin near the barn and it was reduced to ashes also. Mr. McKimney's loss is something over a thousand dollars. He had no insurance.

A Young Lady's Horrible Death.

The 15-year-old daughter of Mr. Ab. Sweet, who lives near Murray, died last Thursday morning from the effects of a burn she received the evening before. She was in the field assisting in burning the sage-grass off a piece of ground and her clothing took fire and before assistance could reach her she was fearfully burned about the face, head and body.—Murray Ledger.

Burglars Booming.

Our city has again been invaded by burglars, about a dozen dwelling houses having been entered by them last Thursday night. Among the number who suffered by the doings of these crooks are the following: L. H. McKee, W. S. Davison, Dr. J. R. Armistead, A. A. Metz, W. H. Fyke, Harvey Moore and David Smith. An entrance was effected to nearly all the houses by cutting the slats and then raising the windows. Mr. Smith lost \$5 in cash; Mr. Moore about \$12, and Mr. Fyke a fine silver watch. The other parties lost articles of wearing apparel mostly. One arrest was made on suspicion, but the proof was not sufficient to hold him, and he was discharged.

Shot at The Conductor.

Mr. C. P. Nolan, of this city, had a difficulty with an N. N. & M. V. conductor named Carroll as the train was approaching Dawson last Thursday and drawing his pistol opened fire. One ball passed through the captain's cap, but did no further harm. It seems that when Mr. Nolan boarded the train at Nortonville he immediately went into the water closet and remained until near Dawson. He claims that when he came out Carroll accused him of trying to "beat" his way when hot words led to blows and the shooting. Mr. Nolan was arrested when he stepped from the train at Dawson and was fined for a breach of the peace and held in a \$100 bond to answer a charge of shooting at another.
