THE AMERICAN NAVY.

It is Not as Powerful as We Have Been Told.

An Interesting Chat with Rear Admiral James H. Hunt, Chief of Staff of the High Office of the Water-Top Post.

"It is very true that our navy is deficient in battleships," says Rear Admiral James H. Hunt, "the British navy, which is the most powerful in the world, has a high out of the water and that in a fight they would make good targets for the enemy to fire at, merely uttering a truth which is the office of the American navy are perfectly familiar. The New York editor who printed that remark and wrote an editorial upon the subject has been severely criticized through the press of the country, so I have observed; but the original statement and the comment made upon it are worthy of the consideration of our people."

"Do you mean, admiral, that we are not provided with battleships with which we might cope with the navies of foreign nations?" "Certainly not. Of course you know I am regarded as an old fogey, and consequently I do not have anything to say about these matters. My own opinion, however, is that we have been building our cruisers and torpedo boats which might be greatly improved. It is true that they attain great speed and that they are great improvements over vessels of the old days."

"But we will have some battleships one of these days, and they will be good ones, too. When the Puritan completed I will be willing to take that vessel and enter into an engagement with all the vessels of our foreign countries which have recently been visiting our shores. The Puritan is to be an iron-hulled, high speed, coast defense motor vessel, two steel barbettes turret, she was commissioned by John Bunch in Chester, Pa. in 1875, and is now in charge of completion at the United States navy yard in New York."

"The Duke and the Inventor." The reported invention of a bullet-proof "minion" recalls the anecdote connected with the Duke of Wellington and a somewhat similar invention. The inventor, having obtained an interview with the duke at the Horse Guards, was requested to put on his armor, which was said to be of some light material worn beneath the clothing. The duke having expressed his approval of it, the inventor, highly pleased, stated on its perfect qualities warmly, until the commander-in-chief quietly asked one of his staff to order the attendance of a file of the guards with a row of ball cartridges. Needless to add, the inventor made a hurried exit, and nothing more was heard of this invulnerable armor.—Broad Arrow.

HELEN KELLER'S GENIUS. Blind and Deaf, yet she Talks and Writes to Perfection. There is now in Washington, the temporary guest of Prof. Alexander Graham Bell, the deaf and blind girl who was born blind, deaf and dumb. Her name is Helen Keller, and though handicapped by the loss of the two senses, she is not only a student at the deaf school, but she is also a student of the national academy of sciences in Washington, considering the case of Helen Keller as incomparably more remarkable than that of her sister unfortunate. He regards her as a wonder, both relatively and absolutely. He does not think that handicaps as she is, she not only can be measured intellectually with other girls who have only one advantage.

HELEN KELLER. Helen Keller has not only learned to read by the aid of Braille and to communicate swiftly by means of the touch, but she has actually gained the power of oral speech and can understand what anyone says by merely placing her fingers delicately on the lips and under the chin. Prof. Bell spoke of Helen Keller one day in one of the institutions for the blind in Boston, sitting in the midst of a group of blind girls who could hear and reading aloud to them.

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ABYSSINIAN MONKS.

Their Life Seems Enjoyable to an English Traveler.

They Retain Third Century Customs and Have Some Remarkable Beliefs—The Famous Monastery of Debra Bizen.

Abyssinia is a country of queer customs and a strange and interesting land. The people are, for the most part, dirty and immoral, inferior in many respects to the Kafirs of South Africa, but they are Christians and have retained to the present day a religion which was taught them in the third century.

A Colored Woman is the Old State's First Female Physician. Sarah E. Jones, M. D., the first woman to be licensed to practice medicine in Virginia, is a daughter of George W. Boyd, the leading colored contractor and builder of Richmond. She was born in Albemarle county, Va., and educated in the public schools of Richmond, being graduated in 1888. She then taught in the schools of Richmond for five years. In 1888 Miss Boyd was married to M. R. Jones, who, at that time, was also a teacher, but now is G. W. A. secretary of the true reformers. Mrs. Jones entered Howard College in 1890, and was graduated in 1893 with the degree of M. D. She appeared before the state medical examining board with thirty-four others, and received a certificate which entitles her to practice in any of the states of the Union.

A ROYAL OCCULTIST. Duke Carl Theodor of Bavaria, now has three hospitals in active service for the treatment of diseases of the eye. One is at Meran, another at Munich, and a third at Tegernsee. At this last he passes most of his time. Poor patients are treated without cost.

MONASTERY OF DEBRA BIZEN. The church is round and built of wood. It has inside two corridors around it where the vulgar may penetrate in the square hole of holes not even the king may enter. The mysterious relics kept by Abyssinians in these innermost recesses claim exceedingly bold origins. In one place they profess to have the original ark of the covenant, in another a large fall of wind blown by the Holy ghost on the day of Pentecost. At Debra Bizen our interpreter told me that they kept the picture of the Madonna which Monck, the son of Solomon by the Queen of Sheba, brought back with him from Jerusalem.

A Chinese Dwarf. There has arrived in Soochow a microscopic prodigy 10 inches in height, aged 21 years, and sporting a flowing gray beard almost as long as himself. The small man has a "cooky" sort of way about him which is all his own, and is dressed in English fashion—coat, hat, boots and all. He tells the gaping crowd of bumpkins who unceremoniously jostle the city swells in their eagerness to hear him speak of the western ocean and to emphasize his information by a flourish of a bamboo tobacco pipe which is much taller than himself. But when desired to give a specimen of language of the country of his nativity he regains his audience with a choice collection of English phrases, squeaked out in an uncertain tone of voice.

READING HIS FACE. How Prof. Hertz's Photograph Improved a Chinese Blindfold. Frank Leslie's weekly employs a man who thinks he can read character from pictures. This individual was recently called upon to interpret a photograph of Prof. Hertz, the famous Presbyterian scholar. Here is the result: A face deeply expressive of concentration, as evidenced by low-set eyebrows, intensity of eye and a general air of thought and absorption. A nose of pronounced form argues an equally distinct individuality, and expanded nostrils suggest enterprise and a ready assimilation of outside impressions. Mouth and chin, though partly concealed, yet give an impression of great firmness, decision and tenacity of purpose, even of a touch of obstinacy. The lower lip is full and speaks of an inner warmth and capacity for sympathy, and imparts to a countenance, wherein mentality is greatly in the ascendant, that touch of humanity whereby all men are kin. A broad and lofty brow indicates mental powers at once progressive and stable, unimpaired, but active and self-reliant. The surroundings of the eyes are expressive of logic and intensity of language, also suggest that form, harmony and method are instinctive; but also in his face the mental predominance, it is the harmony and form of thought which is his intuition, and not that of art. Pose and general air are those of a steady career, not of a dilettante, but of one who has attained to a high degree of self-reliance.
