Two Convicts Captured.

Officers Geo. Walker and Percy McKee captured Will Smith and Henry Taylor, two negro convicts, Thursday night out from the city on the Ohio Valley railroad. The negroes escaped from the Eddyville prison the Monday night before by scaling the walls, and had made their way as far as Gracey. There they boarded the O. V. express for a ride into this city. They had neither tickets nor money and were put off near Woodville. The fact was reported to the officers by the conductor on arrival here and the arrest was made about two hours later. The convicts were lodged in jail until Friday morning when Chief Fritz and officer Walker took them to Eddyville. The arresting officers secured \$200 reward for their work. Smith was sent up for five years from Lexington for highway robbery, and had served forty-five months. Taylor was sent up from Henderson for two years for committing a similar offense and had served out eighteen months of the time.

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The Asylum Bill a Law. Gov. Brown has signed the bill appropriating \$65,000 to the Asylum here for increasing its capacity. Already the Board has begun active preparations for building two wings to the rear of the building. One will extend eastward and the other westward, being joined at right angles to the present wings which with the front form three sides of a square. There is going to be some lively competition for the contract, but it will probably be the policy of the Board and Superintendent to patronize local industries, all things being equal. All of the members of the Board have been appointed a special Building Committee.
