Lexington's big show closed Wednesday. It cleared about \$2,000.

Debs and his associates have been bailed out of jail at Chicago pending an appeal to the supreme court.

The entire Greek ministry has resigned on account of a difference between the King and the Premier.

Francis E. Warren and Clarence D. Clark, Republicans, have been elected Senators from Wyoming.

Bourgeois has declined to be Premier for France, having changed his mind after undertaking to form a ministry.

Howard Jolly's friends at Memphis have made good his shortage of \$2,200, and Mr. Jolly is once more a gentleman and a scholar.

Judge C. D. Clark has triumphed over his enemies and has a second time been confirmed as district judge for Eastern Tennessee.

The sugar trust has won first blood in the United States court, in a decision holding the Sherman anti-trust law inapplicable to its case.

The second attempt to impeach Judge A. J. Ricks, of Cleveland, failed by a vote of 9 to 7 in the House Committee.

Fred Ward, who broke Gen. Grant and afterwards served seven years in the penitentiary, is now working for \$6 a week in a clerk's office at Geneva, New York.

Six senators—Nelson, Harris, Sewell, Cullom, Baker and Elkins, were formally elected Wednesday. The deadlocks in Delaware and Idaho still continue.

A dark horse won the senatorial nomination in the Republican caucus in Kansas. Lucien Baler, state senator from Leavenworth county, was nominated by a bare majority, and will succeed John Martin, Democrat.

Wm. Waldo Astor has given a New York florist an order to place \$100 worth of fresh flowers on his late wife's grave every day for a year, the order amounting to \$38,000. At the funeral the orchids alone cost \$3,800.

The Louisville Post is searching all over Kentucky for a senatorial candidate who is opposed to free silver. He can't be found, Bro. Klot, outside the editorial rooms of the Louisville newspapers, unless you look in the Republican party.

The Madisonville Hustler, following the example of the Lexington Press-Transcript, has arranged to let the women run the Hustler of Feb. 8 in all of its editorial departments. The Kentuckian will, if they desire it, give the Hopkinsville women a similar opportunity to display their ability to run a great newspaper.

Louisville has been enjoying the great extravaganza, Aladdin, Jr., this week, with the seats in the bald-headed rows at the Auditorium all taken. One of the papers pronounced it the best thing ever in Louisville and added that there was but little more to be said. This was probably true, and, judging from the picture—he might have added that there was little more to be seen.
