ABOUT THE WEED. The condition of our market remains about the same as last week. Good tobacco was some stronger while common leaf and lugs were possibly a shade easier. Some new goods were sold at very satisfactory prices but very little of the '94 crop was offered. Receipts are now gradually increasing and may be expected to continue to do so until all the crop is in. The loose market has opened up nicely and a good deal of the weed is being disposed of this manner. Below will be found a partial report of the sales.

Sales on our market this week embraced 265 hds. of new dark tobacco. The only change to report in the condition of the market is a slightly lower range of values for leaf of extra length.
