## THE CITY COUNCIL.

Board of Trade and Commercial Club to issue a Valuable Publication.

A representative of the Worthington Engraving Company, of Evansville, Ind., is working up a publication under the auspices of the city council, commercial club and the board of trade to be used by them as general advertising matter of the city and county.

A similar publication was put out by this concern for the commercial club at Bowling Green and it has proven a valuable publication for that community.

The book will comprise maps of the city and county, about eight pages of statistical matter showing our resources, half-tone engravings of churches, schools, court house, street scenes, manufacturing plants, principal business blocks and 25 of the choice residences.

The publication will be representative and complete in every detail and will be of value to our city and county for it will be put in the hands of immigration committees all over the county by committees appointed by the three local bodies having it in charge.

This book will not be sold, but put in the hands of people that have the interest of our community at heart.

## Bullock Transfers His Franchise.

Sam'l R. Bullock, of New York, who was granted the waterworks franchise on Aug. 6, sold out on the 20th inst. to Wilkinson & Smallhouse, the Bowling Green men who also put in a bid. It is understood that this will not interfere with the work. The new firm assumes the liability of the \$5,000 cash forfeit put up with the council and takes all contracts off Bullock's hands.

A lot has been bought east of the old fair grounds and work is expected to begin at once with a large force of hands.

## The Second Ward Contest.

The squabble over the Democratic nomination in the Second ward will come up for settlement to-night before the city committee.

Chairman Long in answer to letters and telegrams notified the city committee that it was a matter for the local committee to deal with and that he would have nothing to do with deciding the contest. On the face of the returns Mr. M. C. Forbes had one majority. Mr. J. D. Ware contests on the ground of illegal votes and asks the committee to go behind the returns and purge the polls.

## Two Painters Fall Out.

Andre Doricourt and W. C. Shook, composing the firm of Doricourt & Shook, painters, had a falling out Tuesday and Doricourt fired a pistol at Shook. The shooting occurred at Doricourt's house where Shook had been boarding. Shook had gone there to get his clothes with a view to moving. Doricourt was arrested and tried yesterday and acquitted. Doricourt says Shook was accompanied by another man when he went to his house and he believed they meant to do him violence.

## Found Dead in Bed.

Effie Smith, a seven-year-old child of Alex C. Smith, a colored man of this city, was found dead in bed Tuesday morning.

The coroner held an inquest and a verdict was returned that she came to her death from a complication of diseases.

THE HARDIN-BRADLEY DEBATE AT THE FAIR GROUNDS TO-DAY.

Thousands of People Are Expected to Be on Hand to Hear the Discussion—Gen. Hardin will Speak First.

Gen. P. W. Hardin and Col. W. O. Bradley, candidates for governor, will meet in the third debate of the series of eleven joint discussions, at the fair grounds in this city to-day.

The details of the meeting have all been arranged. A stand has been erected upon which there will be seats for about sixteen prominent representatives of the two parties.

Chairman Gary will introduce Gen. Hardin and Chairman Anderson will present Col. Bradley. Both chairmen will preside and they have designated those who will be invited to sit on the stand.

Gen. Hardin will speak first and will begin at 2 o'clock p. m.

Col. Bradley reached the city yesterday at noon by the O. V. and was driven to Mr. A. H. Anderson's, where he is stopping while in the city. He was met by a crowd of Republican politicians at the depot.

Gen. Hardin came at 5:33 by the L. & N. and was met at the depot by a large number of prominent citizens and business men. He is stopping while in the city at Dr. Hill's, the guest of Mr. Geo. E. Gary.
