ICE-BOUND IN SALT LAKE.

An Unexpected Happening in Water That Never Freezes.

The large percentage of salt in the great Salt Lake prevents its waters ever freezing over, and yet a curious incident was related to me of how a small pleasure steamer got icebound a dozen of years ago off the east of Antelope island, says the San Francisco Chronicle.

"It was a curious thing that once happened to me an' Cap'n Dahls," he began, with a preliminary undoing of the knot of his soiled neckerchief.

"We shook hands an' his big voice was a bit husky when he blurted out: 'Say naughtin 'bout it, my boy. I'm certain sure I never had a more able seaman than you've showed to be!'"
