LEANS ON MRS. LAMONT.

That Lady Is Mrs. Cleveland's Closest Intimate.

Socially the Last Six Weeks of the Present Administration Will Be Very Animated—Some Historic Residences.

[Special Washington Letter.] Men like political letters. Young people enjoy descriptive letters. The ladies like society letters.

Write a letter about the ladies of the cabinet," says Pauline Ambler. "Write about their homes and the way they entertain people. Tell them about the intimate friendship existing between the wife of the president and the wife of the secretary of war."

This is the house that Mrs. Cleveland picked, out of all those visited, for her "dear friend." There is almost an obstructed view between the two houses, and, as Old Hickory used to signal to Van Buren across the park when affairs of state were in a hurry, so can Mrs. Cleveland call for her confidential friend when there are little social and domestic questions to be considered.

Miss Ambler says that during the entire administration Mrs. Lamont and Mrs. Cleveland have together settled many problems which have affected political as well as social life. Over the teapot social leaders have been created or decapitated. Over their chocolate they have discussed executive and other state dinners and decided upon the arrangements of their guests, as well as the details of menus.

Mrs. Hoke Smith, who entertained so lavishly and brilliantly last winter, will not be here this winter, because her husband is no longer secretary of the interior. He resigned from the cabinet last August, and the family now resides in Atlanta, Ga.

The small green parallelogram between the white house and the Arlington hotel, in which Secretary Lamont's home is located, has undeniably the most interesting history of any locality in this country.

On the corner above, facing the white house, is St. John's Episcopal church, long known as the "Court church."

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As a monument to the memory of that gentle lady who was the wife of President Arthur, and daughter of gallant Capt. Herndon, who said with his dying breath: "Don't give up the ship."

Facing the northwest corner of Lafayette park, and diagonally opposite the residence of Secretary Lamont, is the antique residence which Commodore Deatur built in 1812. After Deatur's death the house was successively occupied by Henry Clay, Martin Van Buren, Edward Livingston, Jackson's secretary of state; George M. Dallas, Judah P. Benjamin, and finally Gen. Beale, whose guest Gen. Grant has been for weeks at a time.

largest scientific club in the world. It was erected by James Madison in 1801, when he came to Washington to serve as Jefferson's secretary of state.

In the next two houses have dwelt Secretary Windom, Senator Fenton and Col. Robert G. Ingersoll. In the next house below lived Admiral Paulding, a son of the obstinate soldier, John Paulding, who captured Maj. Andre.

The most famous house in the historic square is no longer in existence. Upon its site now stands a grand opera house. It is a shame upon the common sense of our lawmakers that the old residence should have been destroyed.

Later it became the war residence of Secretary Seward, and there the deadly assault was made upon Seward by Payne at the time of Lincoln's assassination. Last it was renovated for the home of James G. Blaine, who dwelt and died beneath its roof.

Society has circled around the square in which these houses of historic renown are located, just as moths flutter around a light. Of course, the wife of the president is "the first lady in the land," and no woman has more worthily worn that title than Mrs. Cleveland has worn it.

The wife of Secretary of the Treasury Curtiss has held a conspicuous social position, and will give numerous entertainments this winter. Secretary of the Navy Herbert, with his handsome daughter, will resume their series of entertainments early in January.

The secretary of agriculture and his sister, Miss Morton, will hold weekly receptions. The wives of the postmaster-general, the secretary of the interior, the secretary of state and the attorney-general will also participate in the social festivities.
