Henry E. Thompson has retired from all connection with the Paducah News and Jas. E. Robertson has assumed personal management of the paper.

The peach crop turns out to be so short that good peaches command the high price of one dollar a bushel in the markets. Perhaps the short peach crop is also due to the Dingley bill.

News has been confirmed that one of Andree's pigeons was killed on the North coast of Lapland about July 22, bearing a message which read: "Eighty-two degrees passed, good journey northward. Andree."

The Banner, the organ of the white Republicans, has washed its hands of the "Citizen's Ticket." It says: "We wish to say we have nothing to do with it. We have no ticket in the field and propose to let the Democrats fight it out among themselves."

The last issue of the KENTUCKIAN contained only eight or ten scoops, but it must be remembered that its principal reporter is absent this week and the news department is compelled to run on one wheel for a week or two.

That duel between Prince Henri, of Orleans, and the Count of Turin furnished a sensation for two continents, but turned out to be a very small affair. Mr. Walter M. Young, one of the proprietors of the Madisonville Mail, will go to Louisville to become foreman of the Dispatch office. Manager Woodson is gathering about him the very best newspaper men to be found in the State, and the Dispatch is already showing the effects of his excellent management. A competent man at the head of its mailing department is now what is most needed.

A MOCKERY OF JUSTICE.

The following is taken from the Albany Law Journal, the leading weekly law magazine in the country: "A more flagrant abuse of the pardoning power which by the various constitutions is lodged in the Chief Executive, than that shown by the official records of the State of Kentucky, has perhaps never been presented. According to the record as compiled and printed by the Louisville Evening Post, the pardons granted by Gov. Bradley and Lieut. Gov. Worthington, while the Governor was absent from the State, between December 10, 1895, and July 30, 1897, number no less than 672; and this number does not include the pardons given in order to restore the recipients to citizenship. Among those pardoned were 32 murderers, who were serving life terms, and 64 men who had committed murder and had been convicted of manslaughter, making 96 murderers turned loose upon society. Besides these 579 persons convicted of robbery, assault and other crimes were given their freedom. This record would be almost beyond belief but for the reliable character of the newspaper which is our authority. These facts and figures throw a flood of light upon the administration of justice in the Bluegrass State. Such wholesale emptying of the State prisons cannot fail to have an important effect in undermining the popular respect for the laws and their just and orderly enforcement, as well as in rendering life and property still more insecure. The community which demands, or even permits, such mockery of justice to be consummated is in a pitiable condition, and it is little wonder that lynch law rules where the pardoning power is thus flagrantly abused."

Prosperity has struck the HOPKINSVILLE KENTUCKIAN in spite of itself. The KENTUCKIAN belongs to that class that said good times could come again no more, but it is rolling in big ads, and can accommodate no more.—Owensboro Inquirer.

The Republican district convention at Owensboro nominated Judge L. P. Little and Joe Noe for Circuit Judge and Commonwealth's Attorney. Both are green squad recruits who enlisted last year, deserting from the Democratic party. Judge Little received only the vote of Daviess county, Ohio and Hancock having withdrawn. The nomination was tendered to E. D. Guffy and D. A. Powers, two straight Republicans, but both refused, and their counties bolted the convention on account of the prominence given the green squad.

Judge Breathitt is non-partisan? but we notice he held a very important place, a member of the Committee on Rules, at the Republican State convention.—Murray Ledger.

A FARMER'S EXPERIENCE.

An Interesting Account of How Corn Land Wheat Was Made to Yield 22 Bushels per Acre.

A South Christian farmer was in our office Friday, July 23, and stated that he sowed 72 acres of corn land wheat on 63 acres he sowed Armer Bone Meal 100 lbs. to the acre.
