RABBIT RANCH.

Novel Enterprise to be Put on Foot at Kennedy.

J. W. Settle Will Fence in a Thicket and Stock It With Molly Cottontails.

News to the KENTUCKIAN comes from Kennedy that a novel enterprise is about to be set on foot in that neighborhood by Mr. J. W. Settle.

Mr. Settle is a man of means and owns a tract of land a part of which is in "glades" or thickets in which hares seem to flourish. It has occurred to him that rabbits, which are becoming very popular as an article of food and readily bring ten cents apiece, could be raised for a profit and he has arranged to enclose about eight acres with a wire netting and stock it thickly with rabbits. It is a well known fact that they multiply very rapidly and he expects to be able to market them in large quantities. Just how he proposes to prevent them from burrowing under the fence, or to protect them from dogs and other invaders, the KENTUCKIAN's informant did not say, but the statement was made that it was a purely business enterprise by a man abundantly able to make it a success.

There are many such farms where Belgian and Himalayan hares are bred at a big profit, but Mr. Settle's plan is to breed the common wild hares. They are not to be domesticated, but allowed to raise their young in their own way, food being put where they can get it when they come out of their hiding places.

It is proposed to begin trapping rabbits at once and have a large number ready to turn in as soon as the fence can be put up and made rabbit proof.
