## AFTER NUMBERING.

Will Begin the Canvass for the 1899 Directory.

The City Council will take action at the regular meeting this week upon the matter of numbering the houses preparation to the adoption of the free delivery system. The city is at present numbered upon what is known as the "Philadelphia system" and about one-third of the houses have numbers. This system starts at number one and allows 100 to each block in every direction from the starting point.

It is said a proposition will be made to the Council to change the system by making the numbers start at 100 instead of one, which would raise all of the present numbers 100 and necessitate the renumbering of every house in the city, at a considerable expense to those who already have numbers on their houses and printed on their stationery. It is not believed the council will listen to any such proposition to make a useless and troublesome change.

As soon as the matter is settled, the preparation of the 1899 edition of Meacham's Directory will begin and enough of the Directories will be printed to supply them gratuitously to all who want them. This will enable everybody to become familiar with the numbers, which will be brought into general and daily use.

Advertisers will be given space at \$5 per page or \$3 per half page, and business men of the city will no doubt assist this public enterprise with their patronage as they have done in the past.

The book itself will be a complete and accurate city directory, containing much general information.
