In order to remove all doubts and technical flaws, another joint session was held in the Capital Hotel Friday afternoon and Gov. Goebel and Lieut. Gov. Beckham were declared elected a second time with every attention to legal forms and requirements. They then took the oath of office again.

### APPLY THE LAW TO TAYLOR.

In a time like this it is difficult to put back the passions that try the souls of men and turn to the methods of the law to right the wrongs suffered at the hands of the criminals. The Democrats of Kentucky are not lacking in courage. They have no fear for the gang of cut-throats parading the streets of Frankfort. They could within two hours assembled enough men in Frankfort to pitch Taylor's uniformed body-guard into the Kentucky river and hang the usurper himself to a tree in the state house yard. But the Democratic party is a party of law and order and, extreme though the provocation has been, the wisdom and counsel of the party leaders must still prevail. The facts themselves furnish their own condemnation. Public sentiment all over the county has tried the would-be dictator and found him guilty of crimes as flagrant as they are audacious.

A gang of desperadoes imported from the feud counties of the state, equipped for bloodshed, were quartered in the public offices of the State. Such of these bullies as were arrested for breaking the laws were promptly pardoned before trial by the usurper who harbored them. Deboe who counseled bloodshed and Finley who organized the mob upon its arrival suddenly quit

Frankfort and the next day one or more of their followers lying in ambush under the same roof that sheltered Taylor fired upon the Governor elect and spilled his life-blood at the very steps of the capitol. Taylor with soldiers at hand, ready for the emergency, promptly blocked pursuit and aided the escape of the principal criminal.

Now that Taylor is no longer an official, but a mere pretender without title to office, the law should turn its attention to him. Taylor is one of the men known to have been in the building converted to the purposes of assassination. There are grounds for believing that he had guilty knowledge of what was to be done. If he cannot clear his skirts, he should himself be indicted for complicity in a crime in which he aided the chief criminal to escape. Many a man has been hanged upon less evidence than there is to connect Taylor with Gov. Goebel's assassination. In the midst of the grief that overwhelms Kentucky, it is well to wait in patience for the re-establishment of the laws subverted and trampled upon by Taylor and then let the heavy hand of the law be laid upon the usurper himself. And Taylor is not alone. The men who advised bloodshed, those who brought armed assassins to Frankfort, those who harbored them and furnished them with arms and ammunition, those who like Taylor witnessed the tragedy of Jan 30 and those who prevented the capture of the assassin are all arraigned at the bar of public opinion and should be arraigned at the bar of justice. The three coordinate branches of the state government, the executive, legislative and judicial, are now in a position to act in concert and the law should exert itself. The State Guards who have been ordered by Gov. Beckham to return to their homes become anarchists and not soldiers if they longer remain in Frankfort to obey the orders of a private citizen.

### BACKED DOWN

Taylor Came Down From His Perch and Released Walker.

Said to be Losing His Mind Over The Trouble He Has Caused.

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 5.—Armed conflict between the civil authorities of Franklin county and the National Guard of the State of Kentucky has been averted, and unless new causes should come to the front there is small likelihood that the political situation will again become as threatening as it has been during the last twenty-four hours.

Taylor yesterday ordered the release of Alonzo Walker, for the possession of whom Judge Moore had declared that Sheriff Suter would swear in a posse and take possession of the Capital grounds if such an extreme became necessary.

(2)—Referring to Executive proclamation of the 1st inst., all members of the Kentucky State Guards ordered on duty in the city of Frankfort by my predecessor are relieved from duty to take effect immediately, and are instructed this day to return to their respective posts.

(Signed) J. W. C. BECKHAM, Acting Governor.

On the back of this order was indorsed the following:

Executed by delivering a true copy to Capt. Bennett, Officer of the Day, in command of troops at gate of Capitol grounds, who reported Gen. D. H. Collier absent from his command.

Capt. Bennett received the paper, and promised to deliver same to Gen. Collier. The delivery was made at 6:20 o'clock p. m., this 3rd day of February, 1900.

(Signed) HARRY MCKAY, Colonel and Aide-de-Camp, Governor's Staff.

The order was delivered to Capt. Bennett at the gate of the Capitol grounds twenty-five minutes before the death of Gov. Goebel.
