Lyddite.

Lyddite is simply picric acid brought into a dense state by fusion. The shells are coated inside with a special varnish, and the melted picric acid is cast into them. As this requires a strong detonator, or a very powerful primer, the government is said to have adopted a primer of picric powder, which consists of a mixture of two parts of ammonium picrate to three parts of saltpetre, manufactured in much the same way as ordinary granulated gunpowder. This is then set off by the ordinary service fuse, says the Engineer.

SECOND SIGHT.

Strange Gift of a Little Girl in Illinois.

Solves a Mystery and Assists in Locating a Missing Woman's Body.

Peoria, Ill., March 29.—When the driving waters of the Illinois river offered up the distorted and discolored body of a young woman at the foot of Chestnut street Monday morning the disappearance of Mrs. Lucy Sommers was solved. But, while this mystery was solved, another was presented, which is puzzling the best minds of Peoria, and which the world in general will discuss for many years to come. This mystery finds partial expression in the questions, "What is the power possessed by Grace Holmes, enabling her to see events occurring miles away and in total darkness? How can this fragile girl's mind penetrate depths which no mortal eye can fathom?"

Mrs. Lucy Sommers was the sister of Mrs. R. B. Craig, of Peoria, and came to this city from her home in Lapel, Ind., to rest for a few weeks and try to recover from an illness which had nearly cost her life itself. She was about 35 years old, an intelligent woman, a devout Christian, a good mother to seven small children, and an honest wife to a hard-working husband. For a time after her arrival in Peoria, Mrs. Sommers seemed to gain in strength, and her friends believed that her health was becoming permanently better. She seemed to enjoy life. She attended Christian Science temple not many blocks from the residence of her sister, and made many friends. All went well until the new year's first day had come and gone, Mrs. Sommers health failed day by day. A fever came upon her and her mind seemed to take strange flights.

It was on the night of Sunday, January 6, that the demented woman fled from her bed in the little home at the foot of the bluff in one of the city's most densely inhabited portions. She was clad only in her nightdress and a red flannel undervest, wearing neither slippers nor stockings upon her feet.

The child made the astounding statement that, while lying in her bed at home more than a mile away on the night of Mrs. Sommers' flight, she had seen the fever stricken woman make her stealthy escape from the house; had marked her flight through lonely alleys and deserted streets, and at last had seen her plunge into the dark waters, which closed over her and left no trace.

The child was supported in her claims by her parents, who stated that she had related all this to them before the fact of Mrs. Sommers' disappearance had been mentioned in the daily papers, and at a time when it was impossible for the girl to have heard anything of the case. The story gained further credence from the little girl's minute description of Mrs. Sommers' appearance and the apparel she wore at the time of her mysterious disappearance. Mr. and Mrs. Holmes claimed further that their little daughter had given many evidences of second sight on previous occasions and they were very urgent in pressing her services in finding the body for the stricken family.

At first, however, her assistance was refused by the relatives of Mrs. Sommers, and it was only after the unexpected failure of the bloodhounds employed in tracing the fugitive that the searchers finally agreed to heed the words of the child clairvoyant, and the dragging of the river commenced.

It was a dramatic scene when the girl, who had been conveyed at her request to a point on the river opposite Fayette street, rose in her seat and declared in her trembling little voice: "She lies there!"

People by thousands crowded at the river's edge to watch, and public expectation ran high all during the dragging, which was carried on for several days, and which conducted under the girl's personal supervision. The faith of even the most credulous was shaken, however, when no favorable results were met with, and it wasn't long until the fragile child with the

queer grey eyes was denounced as a fake.

Then winter set in and the river was locked in ice, and all speculation ceased with regard to the possible secret that lay hidden beneath that crystal barrier; until one day came a mad March wind and tore the ghastly secret from the river's breast and set at rest all doubt and fear and hope forever.




