**PRESSING NEED**

Of Relief For The Ottawa And Hull Fire Victims.

Of These Eight Thousand Are Described as Being Destitute—Many Made Ill.

Ottawa, Ont., April 28.—The estimates on the wreck wrought by Thursday's fire prove to have been under rather than over the mark. A careful survey of the field gives the following results:  
Dead—Seven.  
Homeless—16,000.  
Destitute—8,000.  
Buildings burned—3,000.  
Hands out of work—5,000.  
Value of property destroyed—\$15,000,000.

The loss of lumber alone is put at 125,000,000 feet. This makes a total loss for lumber of about \$3,500,000.  
The greatest need is for ready relief for the sufferers. Quick response has been made from many cities of the Dominion and goods and money are coming in by every train. Workmen have already started in Hull to build shelter for the people. Everything has to be conveyed over the river in boats.

**THREE THEFTS.**

Hauls Included Groceries, Rifles and a Mule.

Crofton, Ky., April 30.—The grocery store of Walter McIntosh, at Mannington, was broken open Saturday night. Several pieces of bacon and some other provisions were carried off.

Dr. Gooch's office at Empire was also entered the same night and two valuable rifles—one a 22-caliber Winchester and the other a 25-caliber Marlin—were taken.

Some one stole a mule from Mr. E. H. Woodson, of this place, the same night and rode it up near Hopkinsville and turned it loose. The animal was found next morning making his way back home. It is believed that the thief who broke into the store at Mannington and office at Empire is the same party who stole the mule. NITRAM.

**WAS TOTALLY BLIND.**

Aged Fruit Hill Lady Passed Away Saturday Night.

The wife of Mr. Max Barnes, died Saturday night at her home near Fruit Hill. She had been in bad health for some time and had been totally blind for several years. She was about 65 years old and leaves a husband and four children, besides a host of friends and relatives. The interment took place in the Barnes burying ground Sunday afternoon.

**SAFE BLOWERS.**

Burglars Enter Depot at Gracey and Get Cash.

The L. & N. depot at Gracey was entered by burglars last Wednesday night and the safe was blown open. It is understood that about \$30 were secured by the thieves. An entrance was effected by prizing open the door. The burglars left no clew and it is not probable that they will ever be apprehended.

**VERDICT OF GUILTY**

In Two Cases—Third Warrant Was Dismissed.

The jury in the case of the Commonwealth against J. H. Ebling, of Fruit Hill, charged with furnishing liquor to a minor, returned a verdict of guilty and assessed a fine of \$50. Defendant was also fined \$20 for selling liquor without a license. The third case was dismissed. The cases were tried in the County Court here, one on Friday last and the other Saturday.

**ARGUMENT**

Will Be Concluded at Washington To-day.

Maxwell and McQuown for Beckham and Helm and Bradley For Taylor.

Washington, April 30.—The Kentucky governorship case will come up before the Supreme Court of the United States to-day. The case will occupy the time of the court to-day and to-morrow. Counsel for Gov. Beckham will file a brief on a motion to dismiss, for want of jurisdiction, and this will be argued, Lawrence Maxwell probably opening for Gov. Beckham, and Helm Bruce making the presentation for the plaintiff in error. The position of Gov. Beckham, to be taken in the brief, is that due process of law was afforded in the contest, and every formality of the statute complied with. Many authorities are cited to sustain the position taken by the Democrats.

**TITLE CLEAR.**

Judge Breckinridge Will Occupy Attorney General's Office.

Frankfort, Ky., April 28.—Yesterday was the last day for Judge C. J. Pratt to execute a supersedeas bond, and thus retain possession of the office till the Court of Appeals passes on the question as to who is really the Attorney General. He failed to file the bond, so an execution can be issued now to place Judge Breckinridge in possession of the office. Judge Breckinridge is not here to-day, being detained in Danville by the illness of his wife, but he is expected Monday to take formal possession of his office.

**MOTIONS FOR BAIL.**

Another Hearing In The Assassination Cases.

Frankfort, Ky., Apr. 30.—The arraignment and motions for bail of the men indicted for complicity in the Goebel assassination will come up before Circuit Judge Cantrill at Frankfort this afternoon. Both sides will introduce evidence, and the hearing may last throughout the week. The grand jury will make a final report today. The warrant against Sheriff Sutton, of Whitley county, will be returned dismissed, no evidence having been found to connect him with the assassination.

**OH! NO, HE'LL NOT RUN.**

Will Be Prevented By Circumstances Beyond His Control.

Frankfort, April 28.—It is stated here on what is thought to be good authority that in the event the court decides against him, Taylor will decline to make the race for re-election this fall. He is worn out physically and is poor. He will probably ask a government position and go abroad. He could be the nominee if he desired, but he will decline to run.

**DIED IN MEMPHIS.**

Wife of Banker Latham, of New York, Passes Away.

Mrs. Mary Allen Latham, wife of Banker J. C. Latham, of New York City, formerly of this place, died suddenly Saturday morning at the home of her parents in Memphis, Tenn., where she spent the winter. She had not been in good health for some time, but had recently been improving. Mr. Latham left there a few days ago and came here on business and the telegram was a great surprise. She leaves no children.
