U. S. SUPREME COURT,

**Harlan Dissenting, Sus-
tains Kentucky Court.**

**No Jurisdiction In the Contest
Case and Gov. Beckham's
Title is Clear.**

THE TEDIOUS LITIGATION AT AN END.

Frankfort, Ky. May 21.—By 5 to 4, Justice Harlan dissenting, the U. S. Supreme court to-day settled the long drawn out Kentucky contest. The Court handed down an opinion sustaining the Kentucky Court of Appeals in holding that the courts have no jurisdiction.

This being the court of last resort, litigation is ended and Gov. Beckham's title to office is now as clear as the noon day sun.

With only one straight Democrat on the Supreme Bench, the Re-

publicans for once can offer no criticism. Their own judges have driven Taylor, the usurper, from his last stand and he is now held up in his true light. He has not only wrecked himself, but has well-nigh wrecked his party and it is not unlikely that he will now be abandoned to his fate. BONNIBERT A WINNER

**Christian County Colt Won
National Stallion Stakes.**

Bonnibert, the great two-year-old colt raised by Williams & Radford at their stable near this city, won the National Stallion Stakes and \$20,000 at Morris Park race track, New York, Saturday.

The National Stallion Stakes was the feature of the racing on that day. This is a stake very much on the line of the Futurity, except that the race is for the progeny of nominated stallions instead of the produce of mares. It is a guaranteed affair worth \$20,000, which is apportioned in proper ratio between the first, second and third horses and the nominators of their sires.

The event has been run twice before. This was the third running. In 1898 John Daly's Jean Bereaud won, and last year Green B. Morris captured the stake with Pupil.

Bonnibert is a son of Imported Albert and Bonnie Ola, and was sold when a year old (one year ago) to Fleischmann Brothers, of Cincinnati for \$1,250. Two thousand dollars of the stakes were made payable to Messrs. Williams & Radford for the honor of breeding the winner.

The race was five furlongs and the time was 1:00 3/4. The track was very heavy, the mud being fetlock deep, and considering this fact such fast time was phenomenal.

Fleischmann Bros. refused an offer of \$20,000 for Bonnibert before this race was run.


