Congressman Oscar Turner, the youngest member of the Kentucky delegation, announces that he will not be a candidate for re-election in the Fifth district. He voluntarily retires, as he would have had no opposition for a renomination.

The St. Louis strikers are to be given a taste of government by injunction. Judge Adams, of the federal district court, has granted a sweeping injunction against them, temporarily enjoining them from interrupting the running of street cars. Arguments will be held next Saturday.

W. H. Reeves, Deputy under C. F. Neeley, the Havana embezzler, has confessed to his part in the stealing and has turned over \$4,600 of the swag to the detectives. He says Neeley gave him this sum to cover up his tracks by falsifying the account books.

County Judge Taylor, of Daviess county, has decided in an election bet case that Goebel was elected and has ordered Jas. Small, a stakeholder, to pay over to Sam Headley a stake of \$50, surrendered after Headley had ordered him not to give up the money pending the contest of the Governorship. The case will be appealed.

No opposition having developed to Hon. Henry D. Allen, the district convention was yesterday called off and Mr. Allen will be formally and officially declared the nominee of the Democratic party at a Committee meeting held for that purpose at Henderson next Tuesday. He will be re-elected to Congress by an increased majority, as the Democrats of the Second district are active, harmonious and united. Mr. Allen during his first term has made a faithful and efficient representative and has well merited the very flattering and unanimous endorsement he has received at the hands of an appreciative constituency. He will enter the next Congress, which we have reason to believe will be Democratic, with the advantage of experience and with greater opportunities for serving his people and we confidently expect to see him take high rank as a leader of the Kentucky delegation in the House.

ALLEN THE NOMINEE.

Committee Will So Declare Next Tuesday at Henderson.

Hopkinsville, Ky., May 21, 1900. TO COMMITTEEMEN:

A convention of the Democratic committeemen, members of the Second Congressional District Committee, is hereby called to meet at Henderson, Ky., Tuesday, May 29th, 1900, for the purpose of declaring the Hon. Henry D. Allen to be the nominee of the Democratic party for Congress in the Second district. This action is to be taken in accordance with the provisions of the call issued May 1 for a district convention June 14, and the call for said convention is hereby rescinded.

The convention call provided that in the event there was no formally announced opposition to Mr. Allen by May 21st, then the formality of holding a district convention would be dispensed with and the chairman and secretary were authorized to declare Mr. Allen the nominee. It is thought best to have this action taken at a full meeting of the District committee, in order to meet all legal requirements for getting the name of the nominee upon the official ballots in a regular way.
