HOSTS IN GRAY.

Confederate Reunion at Louisville Largely Attended.

Old Veterans Present From All Over The United States.

Louisville, May 30.—The tenth annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans began to-day at noon in the splendid new hall erected for this occasion by the people of Louisville. The ex-Confederates and the other visitors have found Louisville swathed with bunting, the stars and bars of the Confederacy predominating. The building in the business part of the city that is not gaily bedecked is so seldom seen that it is hardly noticed, so generally have the business structures been decorated. Besides providing a hall especially for the use of the Confederates, Louisville has appointed committees of her most prominent citizens to see to the comfort of the visitors, and so far the work has been splendidly done.

To-morrow proceedings of the reunion will be merely opening exercises. The only real business that will be transacted will be the appointment of committees on credentials and resolutions. Each division commander will appoint one member of each of these committees and the real business of the reunion will be inaugurated Thursday morning when these committees make their report.

More Than 40,000 Visitors.

Louisville, May 31.—The opening session of the United Confederate Veterans' Association was held yesterday at 12 o'clock in the reunion hall at the foot of Sixth street. The big gathering was called to order by Commander J. M. Poyntz, of Kentucky. The Rev. J. William Jones, Chaplain General of the Confederacy, delivered a prayer, and Mayor Charles P. Weaver delivered an address, welcoming the visitors to the city. Col. Thomas W. Bullitt welcomed the veterans in the name of the Board of Trade, and the Rev. Dr. Carter Helm Jones spoke in behalf of the Commercial Club. Col. Attila Cox, representing the Finance Committee, made a short speech, and was followed by Chief Justice Hazelrigg, Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner and Col. Bennett H. Young.

Gen. John B. Gordon responded for the veterans. The orator of the day was the Rev. Dr. B. M. Palmer, of New Orleans.

Last evening the pictures of famous Confederate Generals, the collection of ex-Lieutenant Governor John C. Underwood, were unveiled in Confederate Hall in the presence of several thousand people. Camp fires were held at Music Hall and at Phoenix Hall. At Music Hall speeches were made by Mr. Henry Watterson, ex-Gov. W. C. Oates, of Alabama, and others. A concert by the Stonewall Brigade Band at Library Hall attracted a big crowd.

The official reports of the various railroad lines show that there has been 41,700 arrivals in Louisville. All the veterans have arrived, and no more guests are expected except those who will come tomorrow to witness the big parade.

SUIT DISMISSED.

Local Firm Not Liable for Plaintiff's Claim.

The suit of Dr. Perry, and others brought at Russellville against Forbes & Bro., of this city, for \$300 was dismissed Tuesday. In December, 1898, Herbert Hayden, an employe of the firm, while at work on a house at Russellville, fell and was badly injured. The attending physicians claimed that one of the firm's agents employed them, and suit was brought. A jury was empaneled and after the testimony of plaintiff's was introduced the case was dismissed by the court. Mr. C. H. Bush represented Forbes & Bro. in the matter.


