LOST \$1,000

By Insisting on a New Trial of The Case.

Special Term of The Federal Court to Try a Big Libel Suit From Hopkinsville.

There was a special session of the United States court in Owensboro Monday, at which the principal business was the trying of the action of Buckner & Co., of Hopkinsville, against the Merchants Insurance company of Newark, N. J. The following jury was sworn to try the case: E. J. Haley, A. G. Crutchfield, Abe Vancleve, J. W. Stephens, Wm. Brown, W. H. Heflin, John A. Lyddane, R. D. Bryant, M. T. Henderson, J. W. Reynolds, Geo. N. Boorman and J. K. Hunter. After hearing the evidence and argument the jury returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiffs for \$2,500.

This is a suit filed by Buckner & Co., insurance agents, against the Merchants Insurance company to recover \$24,000 damages, because of an alleged libelous letter written and circulated by the defendant concerning the plaintiffs. The case had one trial, and the jury returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiffs for \$3,000. A new trial was granted and at the recent term of the court there was an agreement among the attorneys in the case that the damages should be assessed at \$1,500, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly. The insurance company asked the court to set aside the verdict of the jury and the judgment of the court and grant a new trial on the grounds that the attorneys for the insurance company had no right or authority from the company to make any such agreement. The new trial was granted and the special session called to try the case, with the result that the jury returned a verdict as stated in the foregoing. The defendant will appeal the case to the United States court of appeals.—Owensboro Messenger.

JULY WEATHER.

Forecast By W. W. Marsh, Winton Place Prophet.

Mr. W. W. Marsh, the Winton Place weather prognosticator, makes the following prediction for July, 1900. Excessive heat and violent storms are forecasted:

Intense heat will prevail during the month of July, relieved by occasional severe wind and rain storms. Hurricanes will be frequent on the Gulf of Mexico, along the gulf coast and the great lakes, accompanied by severe electrical storms throughout the lake regions, with severe electrical and high windstorms throughout the Ohio, Mississippi and Missouri Valleys, embracing the states of West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Tennessee, Indiana and Kentucky. Low stages of water will prevail in the rivers, the rains at times will be heavy, but of short duration being of little or no benefit to rivers.

Between the 3d and 5th, 12th and 15th violent storms will sweep over the Middle Gulf and South Carolina coasts; severe windstorms or cyclones will pass through sections of Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, Wisconsin and Missouri. Severe electrical storms, accompanied by high wind, will visit the States of Michigan, Mississippi and the Middle Atlantic coast. Severe storms will prevail from the Mississippi Valley to the Atlantic Coast.

Rain and thunderstorms along the Ohio River from Pittsburg to Cairo, in the Kanawha and Tennessee Valleys, and throughout the Allegheny and Monongahela Valleys, but the rain will be of little benefit to rivers. Severe cyclonic storms, high gales through the lake regions being very severe at Detroit, Cleveland, Grand Rapids, Chicago, Toledo and Milwaukee, Wis. Storms will be severe through Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and West Virginia.

Between the 12th and 15th and 18th and 20th the East will be storm swept, the storm being very severe through the States of New York, Maryland, New Jersey, New England and their coast.

Between the 18th and 20th and 26th and 28th the States of Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota, Kansas and the Dakotas will be visited tornadoes and cyclones. Heavy rains and thunderstorms throughout Georgia, Alabama and the Central South. General rains and thunderstorms, with high wind over the entire country west of the Mississippi River, extending into Illinois and Tennessee, electrical storms. High winds through the Ohio Valley, being most severe through the upper Ohio Valley, throughout Indiana. Violent windstorms will again prevail in the Northwest and North.

Texas will again be flooded by heavy rains, commencing about the 19th and continuing for several days.

COUNTY CALL.

Precinct Conventions Ordered For Saturday July 14, at 2 p. m.

At a meeting of the Democratic Executive Committee held in Frankfort, Ky., May 20, it was ordered that on Saturday, July 14, 1900, at 2 p. m., standard time, there shall be held in each of the voting precincts of all the counties of the State at the usual voting places, a precinct convention for the purpose of appointing delegates to the county convention to be held at the Court house, Monday, July 16, at 2 p. m., which county convention shall in turn appoint delegates to a State Convention to be held in Lexington, Ky., on Thursday, July 19, 1900, for the purpose of nominating a Democratic candidate for Governor.

The basis of representation for precinct delegates shall be one for each fifty votes, and fraction over twenty-five cast for Bryan Electors in 1896. The basis of representation for county delegates shall be one delegate for each two hundred votes, and fraction over one hundred cast for the head of the Democratic electoral ticket at the Presidential election in 1896.

All persons who will be legal voters in the State next November, who are devoted to the principles of the Democratic party, and desire to see these principles succeed, who by participating in the district and county convention will feel in honor bound to support the nominee of the Democratic party for Governor, are hereby invited to participate in said meetings.
