A woman traveler in Egypt is amazed at the dearth of the natives' household goods. There is little furniture, because the Arab needs little. His life is spent out of doors and he can sleep in any handy gutter as peacefully and happily as a child, while most of his meals are eaten in the open air.

In one exceptionally luxurious house, that of a charwoman, the traveler found a parlor. It was regarded as a sort of shrine by Fatima. The visitor was shown through a broken-down doorway into a squalid passage where two rooms at either end revealed perspectives of greater squalor beyond. While contemplating her sanctum the children from below had crept up stealthily, they had collected behind the visitor in the doorway and had seated themselves in wide-eyed wonder on the doorstep. **WHEELER AND YERKES**

**Locked Horns at Cynthia Monday, Holding Rival Meetings.**

Cynthia, Ky., Sept. 24.—The Democrats and Republicans locked horns here today in old-fashioned style, and the occasion will be remembered as a notable one in the political history of Harrison county. Rival political rallies were held, the Democrats being addressed by Congressman Charles K. Wheeler and Mr. J. N. Kehoe, while the Republican crowd listened to speeches by Yerkes, Congressman S. J. Pugh and Wood Dunlap. Mr. Yerkes' crowd filled the opera house, which holds about 1,000 people, and Mr. Dunlap spoke to an overflow meeting of 300 or 400. Messrs. Wheeler and Kehoe spoke to 3,000 people in the courthouse square. The Democrats dwarfed the Republican rally by turning out in a street parade with four bands and over 1,000 men in line. During the day there was a score of fist fights by over-zealous partisans.

**DEATH OF A. C. MAYES.**

**Fifty Years a Merchant at Princeton and Thirty Years a Justice of the Peace.**

Princeton, Ky., Sept. 24.—A. C. Mayes, aged seventy years, died here this morning at 6:30 o'clock after a long illness. He was a merchant of this city for forty years, was thirty years agent for the Courier-Journal and thirty years a magistrate of Princeton magisterial district. During his thirty years as magistrate he only failed to attend the meetings of the Fiscal Court once, and that was during his last illness. The funeral services will take place at the Christian church tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock under the auspices of the Masonic and Odd Fellows fraternities. The funeral service will be preached by the Rev. J. C. Read, assisted by the Rev. C. L. Nourse. The body will be interred in the city cemetery.

**The Love of Two Girls.**

There is a thrilling story of danger and of lost love in the October number of The Delineator. It is dated back in the romantic Acadian days by the master of Canadian fiction, Charles G. D. Roberts. A wounded ensign beloved by two girls is saved by both, solely because of the self renunciation of one, who goes back to die in order to delay his pursuers. It is a skillful piece of heart anguish done into words. . . The same number has a picturesque Chinese article illustrated by several genuine photographs of Chinese women; a rare thing in the present rush of Chinese literature. . . The Delineator is quite up to-date in the eighty or more sketches of present-day styles which are shown in its pages. For thirty years it has been trusted by American women for guidance in home dressmaking and home management.

A very notable and timely project is begun in the October number of Scribner's Magazine. There is no factor in the Far East of greater importance than Russia, and just at this time the series of seven papers on "Russia of To-day," by Henry Norman, will attract the widest attention. Mr. Norman is well known by his books on international politics and travel among them "The Peoples and Politics of the Far East." He has travelled all over the world and is acquainted with its most important political personages. This series of articles on Russia is founded on a trip taken recently especially for Scribner's Magazine, and it included a journey over the great Trans-Siberian Railroad, with abundant opportunities to inspect the life of the people in Siberia.

**Berry Howard At Pineville.**

Pineville, Ky., Sept. 24.—Berry Howard, one of the parties indicted for the murder of Gov. Goebel, was in Pineville Saturday mixing with his Republican friends. Deputy Sheriff James Gross, who resides near Howard's home, twelve miles from this place, was with him. Henry Broughton, Sheriff of this county, was with him on the streets during the day, but made no effort to arrest him. It is a matter of considerable comment that Howard has recently shaved his mustache off, which makes quite a change in his appearance.

**CLEANING UP.**

**Paid Men Put To Work At Galveston.**

Many Bodies Washed From The Cemetery By The Tidal Wave.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 24.—Under the supervision of Chairman Jens Moller, of the Committee on Public Labor, nearly 1,000 men went to work to-day cleaning the streets and beach front of debris and dead bodies. The wages are \$2 a day for laborers, \$3 for men and carts and \$3.50 for men and teams, the money to be paid out of the general relief fund.

After being closed for a fortnight the saloons opened this morning with the consent of the Mayor.

The railroads are trying to get their new track in the storm-swept district between here and Houston placed in good order, but find it difficult to get men. While the city was under martial law and men were being impressed to bury the dead and clear away debris, hundreds of men were glad to get out of town and work for the railroads.

Gov. Sayers will arrive here tomorrow to confer with the Central Relief Committee in regard to giving out a statement of contributions received for the relief of Galveston; also in regard to the matter of providing funds for the support of necessary departments of the city government.

The storm swept away a great many of the coffins which had been placed in vaults in the city cemeteries. Among the missing coffins is that which contained the remains of Charles Coghlan, the actor, who died here on November 27 last. His remains had been placed in a receiving vault, awaiting final disposition upon orders of his relatives.
