### BIG SUIT FILED.

Thirty Thousand Dollars Involved—Estate Worth \$85,000.

R. H. Kelly, executor of James Bradshaw, deceased, filed suit in the Circuit Court yesterday, making Robt. Kelly, Dr. John A. Gunn and others defendants. The petition states that Dr. Gunn, as agent for Mr. Bradshaw during his lifetime, is indebted to the said estate in the sum of \$30,000 and he is called upon for an accounting of his transactions in the premises. The petition further alleges that said amount is receipts, money and other property that come into said defendant's hands during his said agency.

The estate is valued at \$85,000. Landes & Allensworth are the attorneys for the plaintiff. The petition covers fourteen pages of legal cap, type written. The case will come up at the Spring term.

### HEART DISEASE

Ends Life of Well Known Newspaper Man.

Mr. L. J. Oldham, editor of the Todd County Democrat, died at his home in Trenton Sunday, after an illness of several months, of heart trouble. He had been engaged in the newspaper business for several years ago. He was about 37 years old, a K. of P. and a Mason. He leaves a widow and one child—a little daughter.

The interment took place in Trenton Tuesday with Masonic honors.

Deceased joined the Methodist church at Elkton in 1894. He married Miss Bessie Yonts about nine years ago.

Mr. Oldham was very popular, both as a journalist and a citizen, and leaves a host of friends who extend sympathy to his widow and daughter in their bereavement.
