If the newspaper reports are true, Senator Chandler of New Hampshire will on March 4 leave the senate with much reluctance.

Senator Clark, of Montana, celebrated his re-election to the Senate by giving a blow out that cost \$30,000 for the wine bill alone.

Sydney B. Everett, minister "Gumshoe" Hunter's Secretary of Legation at Cautemala, committed suicide on account of ill health.

The Boers captured another town this week, taking 200 British prisoners after killing and wounding 30 in the fight. The prisoners were disarmed and released.

The 100th anniversary of the appointment of Chief Justice John Marshall was celebrated in many cities of the country on the 3rd inst.

Emperor William has left England and returned to Germany. He drove through the streets of London with his uncle, King Edward, and was given an ovation.

Maj. Gen. Nelson A. Miles has been nominated by the President, by a vote of the cabinet, to be Lieutenant General, the highest rank in the army.

The Democratic legislative convention of Fulton and Hickman Counties nominated Mott Ayers, but there was a split in the convention and another faction nominated Robt. B. Flatt.

The Kentucky state guard is composed of 102 commissioned officers, 257 non-commissioned officers, sixteen musicians, 1,116 privates, a total of 1,389. The number of men available for military service is 410,000.

Garnett D. Ripley, of Henry county, has been indicted and placed in jail, charged with being deep in the conspiracy with W. S. Taylor and others to murder Gov. Goebel. Ripley was a captain of one of the companies of Taylor's bodyguard and it is claimed was implicated in all the details of the plot.

Mrs. Nation is still wrecking saloons in Topeka and submitting quietly to arrest after each "joint" has been raided. She promptly gives bond and resumes business the next morning. In order that Mrs. Nation may not appear as too flagrant a law-breaker, it must be understood that Kansas is a prohibition state and that the saloons are running with no legal status and have no right to claim protection under the law. In fact the Chief of Police in Topeka is putting no obstacles in her way and says he does not care if she smashes every saloon in Topeka.

GOLD BULLETS

Shot Into British Officers By a Rich Boer.

One of the returned Canadian volunteers from South Africa tells a strange story of the vengeance of a wealthy Boer who was ruined in estate and rendered desperate by the death of his two sons—his only children—who were slain in battle early in the campaign. They were big, manly fellows, and the pride of their parents. The father—Van Bosboom—was, prior to the war, the owner of a valuable gold mine, and had by him a good supply of the precious metal. When the news of his sons' death reached him he shouldered his rifle, which he called "Lobengula," and started out to join the Boer army, his soul thirsting for revenge. In a mould which bore his own initials he cast a number of golden bullets and carried them in his cartridge belt. Van Bosboom is 55 years of age, and a noted rifle shot and sharpshooter having never been known to miss his aim. How deadly was his vengeance is vouched for by Real Huot, the returned Canadian volunteer, who reports that whenever the British ambulance corps carried their dead and wounded off the fields of battle upon which Van Bosboom had fought they invariably found a number of officers and men, the former especially, who had been shot in the middle of the forehead, and when the surgeons extracted the bullets they were found to be of gold and to bear the initials of the name of the avenging father.
