Cadiz Committee Asks Hopkinsville to Lend a Hand.

The Gracey Route Proving Much More Expensive Than the Others For New Road.

Messrs. D. L. Grinter and Kee R. McKee, accompanied by the promoter of the proposed Cadiz railroad, came to Hopkinsville Wednesday and at night held a conference with some of the leading business men, relative to the choice of routes.

The gentlemen asked that Hopkinsville raise about \$8,000 or \$10,000 to aid them in paying for the right of way through the rich farming lands between Montgomery and Gracey. The proposed routes to Cerulean, Wallonia and Cobb are not through such valuable farms and are practically free, but the farmers on the Gracey route want heavy damages.

The Gracey people themselves are indifferent to the road, as Gracey is now the distributing point for Cadiz and with the road by Gracey would become a mere way station.

This disposition along the route to charge for the right of way and opposition in Gracey is about to divert the road to Cerulean or Cobb.

As a last resort the Cadiz people appealed to Hopkinsville to come to their assistance.

The meeting was fairly well attended and the matter was discussed pro and con and a committee was appointed to see what could be done about the matter. Mr. E. B. Bassett is at the head of the committee.

The route is to be definitely selected and located on March 10th, and what is to be done will have to be done speedily.

MASON ACQUITTED.

Slayer of Henry Gaither Tried And Cleared.

The trial of Jack Mason, col., charged with killing Henry Gaither, also colored, at Gracey, last year was tried Tuesday and Wednesday. Mason made out a good case of self defense and the jury brought in a verdict of acquittal.

The murder trial of James H. Burrows, who killed Otis Lacy, at a festival near Fawnview last September, was begun yesterday. These parties also are negroes. The trial will be concluded to-day.

WILLIS G. PERRY

Dies Wednesday At His Home In This City.

Mr. Willis G. Perry died Wednesday afternoon, at his home in this city, after an illness of several weeks, of cerebral effusion, in the 56th year of his age.

Willis Gaylord Perry, youngest child of the late Rev. Gideon B. and Abby B. Perry, was born in Lee, Oneida county, New York, Dec. 22, 1845. His childhood was passed in Cleveland, Ohio, where his father, the late Rev. Gideon Babcock Perry, D. D., L. L. D., was rector of St. Paul's, Grace and St. James' churches successively, and his early boyhood was spent in Natchez, Miss., his father being rector of Trinity church in that city.

He was educated at Washington College and at Kenyon College, Gambria, Ohio.

In the fall of 1867, Mr. Perry came to Hopkinsville, at which time his father became rector of Grace Episcopal church, and had lived here ever since. He was taken sick four or five weeks ago and had been gradually growing worse until his vitality was exhausted.

Funeral services at 2.30 o'clock, this afternoon.
