## FREE JULY 1st

Will be 52 Miles of Pike and 11 More to be Built.

Fiscal Court Completes its Work, Appropriating All of The \$90,000.

The Fiscal Court, after making final arrangements for opening the toll gates, adjourned Friday.

Every mile of turnpike in the county will be open July 1st.

There are 52 miles of the old roads purchased and 11½ miles of new road will be built. The new road will be used to piece out the county pikes on five dirt roads and this will make every road running into the city a free-metalled highway for not less than five miles. Of the old roads one is 25 miles, one 10 miles, one 8½ miles and several others not so long.

The new roads will be distributed as follows:

On Princeton, one mile of new road, making 5 miles, 9 feet wide.

On Buttermilk road, 3½ miles new, making 5 miles, 9 feet.

On Madisonville road 2 miles new, making 5 miles, 16 feet.

On Greenville road, 2 miles new, making 5 miles, 9 feet.

On Butler road, 3 miles new, making 5 miles, 2 miles 16 and 3 miles 9 feet.

The metaling will be 10 to 12 inches in thickness, and work will begin June 1st. The new roads will cost \$21,000 in the aggregate.

The county already owned several miles of pike in short pieces and these added to the others will make about 75 miles of free pikes in the county when existing orders are carried out.

## NEW REGIMENT

Of Confederate Veterans Formed in Western Kentucky.

Ten Camps Embraced and Members Will Attend Memphis Reunion in a Body.

A large contingent of the Confederate veterans and their friends from Hopkinsville and Christian county are preparing to attend the Memphis reunion of the United Confederate Veterans. The Second Confederate Veteran Regiment has been formed with the following camps: Hopkinsville, Madisonville, Henderson, Evansville, Uniontown, Marion, Princeton, Kuttowa, Cadiz and Elkton. Col. T. J. Johnson, of Princeton, is colonel of the regiment; L. D. Hockersmith, of Madisonville, Lieutenant Colonel; Robert Crabb, of Marion, First Major; and C. F. Jarrett, of Hopkinsville, Second Major.

A special train, on independent schedule will leave Evansville on the 27th inst., going via Princeton, and the above named camps will be consolidated at the latter place.

A separate coach will be provided for each camp and its friends, and all friends of the various camps are invited to go on the occasion. Visitors will be given the same low rates extended to the veterans. Not less than 75 people, and possible 100, may go from this place.

The veteran will be in uniform. Some of the men will wear the same uniforms that served them forty years ago, and a number of flags, both those carried in the war and those presented to them since that time, will be taken to the reunion.

Much interest is manifested both among the old soldiers and among the general public in the approaching gathering, and the number of those who will attend is being increased daily.

Quite a number of Hopkinsville people have decided to go down to Memphis on the same train with the old Confederate soldiers, especially those desiring to avoid night travel.

### LIQUID AIR MARVELS.

Beefsteak Dipped in It Smashes if Dropped.

According to the Kansas City Times, a Paris correspondent says that M. D'Arsonval gave a successful demonstration at the Museum of Natural History of the qualities of liquefied air. By enormous pressure he reached a temperature of minus 180 centigrade. The liquefied air was contained in a double-sided silver-covered bottle and did not evaporate. Experiments with India-rubber bottles showed that they became as hard and brittle as glass. The rubber could be pulverized, but became elastic again when the air was evaporated.

M. D'Arsonval showed a beefsteak dipped in liquefied air, and then let it fall on the floor, when it sounded like a stone and broke in pieces. It was eventually reduced to a pink powder, easy to masticate and assimilate, likely to be of important service to hospitals. Ice dipped in liquefied air cut glass like a diamond, mercury became hard as antimony. Metals, especially steel, had their qualities increased tenfold by the application of liquefied air. Conducting wires could be reduced to a hair's breadth in thickness and remain as strong as enormous cables.

Liquefied air cannot, however, do anything to preserve meat, as it is in no way antiseptic and will not kill microbes. Moreover, it is now five times dearer than ice. Nor can it be used for motor carriages or submarine boats, because when heated it is such a powerful explosive that no metal yet known could resist its shocks. M. D'Arsonval warned the French public to beware of companies collecting money for preserving meat or propelling motors by liquefied air. Personal experiments showed that such experiments must necessarily end in failure.

### Climate of Northern Ontario.

The climate of northern Ontario is not unlike that of northern Europe, and its soil is equal to that of many thickly-peopled portions of the old world, while extensive spruce and pine forests and large deposits of gold, iron, nickel and copper ores are provided by nature to form the basis of large industrial enterprises into whose service many of the water powers which abound there will no doubt some day be largely brought.
