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YOUNGERS PAROLED.

Former Train Robbers the Beneficiaries of a Law Passed by Legislature.

St. Paul, May 7.—At a regular meeting of the Board of Managers of the State Prison to-day at Stillwater unanimous action was taken in favor of paroling the Younger boys, serving life sentences. Before the parole can be effective all three members of the State Pardon Board must approve it, and the action will be submitted to that body as soon as possible.

This is in accordance with the new parole law, which allows the parole of life prisoners after about twenty-four years' imprisonment, being thirty-five years less time gained by good behavior. Paroles usually are granted by the prison managers alone, but in the case of life prisoners unanimous approval of the Board of Pardons is also necessary and such paroled life prisoners cannot leave the State.

The Pardon Board does not meet regularly until in July, but a special meeting may be called if the members of the board consider one necessary.

The Younger brothers have been in Stillwater since 1876 for the Northfield bank robbery and the murder committed during the progress of the raid.

One Has Died in Prison.

Cole, James and Bob Younger were imprisoned for their raid on the Bank of Northfield in September, 1876. The James brothers, Jessie and Frank, escaped to Missouri. Two members of the gang were killed and Bob Younger died in prison.

The half-eaten bodies of two English missionaries and their followers were found by a searching party in New Guinea. The cannibals had killed them.

Dr. McCormick Is Grateful That We People Stood By Him.

To THE PUBLIC:
In taking my departure from Hopkinsville, I wish to take this opportunity to thank the good people who have treated me with kindness and offered their confidence and sympathy. From the very beginning of the troubles thrust upon me through the machinations of my enemies and their allies in official places, I have been sustained by the good will of those among whom I came as a stranger ten months ago. I first requested and latter demanded an investigation of the trumped-up charges against me, and made a full explanation of the matter to the Board of Commissioners, a majority of whom were my political opponents. It is gratifying to me that these gentlemen, four of them lawyers and accustomed to weighing evidence, by unanimous vote expressed their confidence in my innocence and twice demanded a trial for me.

It is a further source of satisfaction that the business men of Hopkinsville—many of whom did not know me but knew my enemies—almost without exception showed their confidence in my innocence by making appeals by wire and by mail to the Governor in my behalf, which appeals were treated with the same silent contempt shown the official communications of the Board. The same character of indorsement was given me by the employes of the institution over which I presided, employes who had for months had every opportunity to judge between me and my accusers.

I am especially thankful to the physicians of the city, who so far as I am advised are unanimously on my side in this trouble and believe with the other good people of Hopkinsville that I was made the victim of a conspiracy that will in time be laid bare before a tribunal not organized to convict without trial.

The citizens of Hopkinsville, irrespective of party or color, have also placed me under lasting obligations by giving me a vote of confidence in a public meeting at the Court House, some of the ministers even making themselves heard in my defense. With the endorsement of my official associates, my board of commissioners, my professional brethren, the religious element, the business men, and the good citizens of the community, I leave Hopkinsville with a thankful heart, feeling that my reputation is safe in the hands of those who know my defamers best.

MISS TAYLOR QUILTS.


Another Lady Attendant Resigns From the Asylum.
