DISPUTES HER CLAIM.

New Yorker Says Miss Ollie Tyson Is Not an Heiress.

Has Hired a Lawyer To Investigate and Talks Like He Was The Whole Thing.

New York, Aug. 17.—Heirs of John Tyson, a multi-millionaire of Australia, who recently died without leaving a will, are preparing to hurl a bomb at the hopes of Miss Ollie Tyson, who lives in Todd county, Kentucky, and who says that Tyson was her uncle. Tyson was a celebrated and eccentric character in the land of sheep and kangaroos, where he accumulated a fortune of \$40,000,000, and his fair namesake of Kentucky was informed that her portion would be \$2,000,000.

Her claim, however, is about to be disputed by Charles A. Tyson, a grocer, living at 37 Grand street, Port Richmond, who alleges that John Tyson, was his granduncle, a brother of his (Charles') grandfather, and that consequently the Australian could not have been the uncle of Miss Ollie Tyson, a maid of but tender years.

"I never saw or heard of Ollie Tyson," said the grandnephew in an interview, "and know nothing about her except that the papers depict her as a charming woman. But I cannot help thinking she is in error when she says, according to the papers, that this John Tyson was her uncle, and only went out to Australia fifteen years ago."

"My information is that John Tyson left Scotland, where my grandfather lived, about forty years ago, and spent a long life in accumulating money by sheep farming. Well, either there are two John Tysons or else one of us is mistaken."

"Far be it from me to disappoint the pretty claimant in Kentucky, but I'm not a person of great means myself, and if I am in the right you can bet that I'll go after that money."

Tyson has been notified that John Dickey, a Philadelphia lawyer, is authorized to collect information as to the Tyson heirs in America, and he is going there to present his claims.

GIRL BABIES.

No Future Voters So Far Among Administration Kids.

The Governor and Harry Tandy Take the Paternal Degree the Same Day.

Frankfort, Ky., August 16.—Mrs. Jean Fuqua Beckham, wife of Gov. Beckham, gave birth to a child this morning. The accouchment took place at 6 o'clock at the Executive Mansion and Drs. E. E. Hume and C. C. Owens were the attending physicians. Mother and child are doing well. The Governor was notified of the event at Owensboro, but too late to catch a morning train. He will arrive here this afternoon. The baby at the Mansion is a girl. She has the proud distinction of being the first child of a Governor to be born in that historic building, which has been occupied by the wives and families of thirty-three Chief Executives. Mrs. Julia Beckham, the mother of Gov. Beckham, came to it as a child of three years, when her father, Charles A. Wickliffe, the tenth Lieutenant Governor, became Governor upon the death of Gov. James Clark in 1836. The present Mrs. Beckham was Miss Jean Fuqua, of Owensboro. She became the wife of the Governor Nov. 21, 1900.

HARRY TANDY'S BABY.

Frankfort, Ky., August 16.—Assistant Secretary of State Harry Tandy sees the Governor. His wife gave birth to a daughter last night, making two administration infants of the same age.

OTHER RECENT ARRIVALS.

To this lengthy list from Frankfort may be added another girl in administration circles, the infant daughter of Dr. W. A. Lackey, born a month or two in the asylum here.

NEGRO BURGLAR SHOT.

Desperate Crook Caught in The Act of Robbing a Store.

Paducah, Ky., Aug. 18.—Eugene Edwards, proprietor of a grocery and saloon, shot and killed Zeno Williams, colored, early this morning while the latter was in the act of robbing his place of business. When Williams saw Edwards he threw a hatchet at him, which barely missed his head. After being shot he turned and threw a beer bottle at him. Williams ran to the front of the building, jumped through a glass window and fell dead a few feet from the store. He was one of the most desperate negroes in this city. At the coroner's inquest Edwards, who is a highly respected young man, was exonerated.
