MURDER MYSTERY.

Hopkinsville Negro Killed at Madisonville Last Week.

Coroner's Jury Accuses Joe Robertson, who is Arrested.

The remains of Richard Lackey, a son of George Lackey, of this city, were brought here yesterday for interment. Lackey was a young negro about 28 years old, who was killed at Madisonville Saturday night, or rather his corpse was found there.

Lackey's body was found in the kitchen of his residence with a bullet hole in his heart, it having entered on the right side, passing almost through the body, striking the heart. A pistol was found clasped loosely in his right hand. Before the coroner's jury Mrs. Hibbs, who lived next to Lackey's house, declared that last Friday afternoon about 4 o'clock, she saw Lackey and Jos. Robertson standing in the yard near Lackey's house. Both men seemed to be angry, and a heated discussion was going on. Presently, she swore Robertson drew a revolver from his pocket and fired twice at Lackey, who staggered back a short distance but did not fall. Robertson then ran around the back way and entered his own home. The witness said Lackey did not seem to be hurt, and walked slowly around the house and entered through the kitchen door.

Mrs. Hibbs said she paid no further attention to the matter, not thinking any one was hurt. She said, however, that she had not seen Lackey since the shooting until this morning, when the body was discovered.

Arrest is Made.

On Mrs. Hibbs' testimony Robertson was arrested and lodged in jail. When Robertson reported his discovery to the authorities this morning he at once advanced the theory that Lackey had committed suicide, and pointed to the pistol found in Lackey's hand to corroborate this theory. It would have been impossible for Lackey to fire the shot that ended his life with his right hand, as the bullet entered the right arm in such a manner that he could not have placed the pistol there.

The verdict of the coroner's jury is that Lackey came to his death from a shot fired from a revolver in the hands of Jos. Robertson.

Those who know Lackey say he was a quiet, harmless fellow. Robertson is a street jewelry peddler and had heretofore borne a good name.

Named to Take Charge of Quarles Bros., Business.
