SENSATION IN LOGAN.

Assault and Murder of a Young Girl Near Homer.

Dead Body of the Murderer Found Where He Had "Committed Suicide."

Miss Zada Vick, a young sixteen-year-old daughter of Mr. Chas. M. Vick, a farmer residing near Homer, in Logan county, was murdered Wednesday about noon. She went alone to a spring in a valley some distance from the house to get a bucket of milk for dinner. Not returning, a search was made and her dead body was found about 4 o'clock near by, hidden behind a large stone in a fence corner and covered with leaves. Her skull was crushed in with a stone lying not far away. A post-mortem examination showed that she had been outraged previous to her murder. Tracks of the murderer showed that he wore heelplates on his shoes. Bloodhounds were put to work, but proved of no service. Hundreds of people continued the search Thursday and it soon became known from a series of suspicious circumstances that Hugh Marshall, a white man living a mile or two away, of a low order of intelligence, was the probable murderer. His family was away from home. His house was found deserted with a fire in the stove, showing that Marshall had not been gone long. Thursday and Friday were days of excitement, but Friday afternoon one of the searching parties reported that they had found the dead body of Marshall hanging in a lonely barn two miles from the scene of the murder, where he had "suicided." On his feet were found shoes with the tell-tale heelplates. A jury was empaneled and the suicide theory promptly backed up by a verdict.

SHOT IN THE FACE.

Wounded Boy Not Considered Seriously Hurt.

A shooting occurred Saturday night in a cabin two miles west of the city. It seems that Will Whitlock was in the house, when Sherman Dawson, another colored boy, entered. Whitlock had a pistol in his hand and fired. The ball struck Dawson in the face, making a painful wound. It is claimed that the parties were only playing and that the shooting was accidental. No warrant has been issued.

GOES TO CLINTON.

Prof. Calvin Receives a Merited Promotion.

Prof. J. M. Calvin, of this county, a young man who has steadily worked his way upward in his chosen profession, left this week to enter upon his duties as Superintendent of the Public Schools at Clinton, Ky. Prof. Calvin was the Democratic nominee for superintendent of schools for Christian county last year and reduced the Republican majority one-half. He is a young teacher of fine character and holds a state certificate.

JUDGE WATKINS.

Gracey's New Police Judge Named at Last.

The squabble over the police judgeship at Gracey was ended by holding a new election. J. P. Meacham whose election was contested by H. T. Watkins, declined to press to matter further, withdrawing in the interest of Mr. Watkins. The council at a called meeting then harmonized matters by electing Mr. Watkins, whose commission is daily expected from Frankfort.

"Grammar," in all its branches, by Miss Willie Jackson, of Pembroke.

At the afternoon session Prof. Burnett will talk about "Oral Lessons."

Prof. Cherry will discuss the "Teacher's Duty to be Physically Able to Teach."

Prof. W. F. Alexander will take "Narcotics" as his subject, and discuss hygienic laws and physical culture also.

Miss Dovie Anderson will take "Composition" as her theme.

The concluding topic will be an outlined course of instruction by Prof. Cherry.

The Institute will be in session until Friday afternoon, the program being announced from day to day. On Thursday evening Prof. Cherry will lecture at the court house on some branch of school work. He is a graduate of Harvard and those interested in educational matters should not fail to hear him.


