SUDDEN END.

Will Stoner Dead at Great Falls, Montana.

Mr. W. T. Tandy, of this city, received a telegram Friday announcing the sudden death of Mr. Will T. Stoner, formerly a resident of this community, at Great Falls, Montana.

The message was from the Exalted Ruler of the B. P. O. E. lodge, of which organization the deceased was a member. The news came as a great shock to his sister, Miss Mary Stoner, who was attending the Teachers' Institute in this city.

For several years he had been Western representative of Sprague, Warner & Co., of Chicago. Mr. Stoner's last visit to Hopkinsville was made during last January. He was about 32 years of age and had been in the West for ten or twelve years.

Particulars of his death have not been received.

Health Officer's Report for Month of August.

Health Officer Woodward's report of births and deaths in the city during the months of August is as follows: Deaths, 10; births, 4. Causes of death: Typhoid fever, 2; appendicitis, 1; consumption, 1; summer complaint, 1; infantile diarrhoea, 1; general debility, 1; paralysis, 1; flux, 1; dysentery, 1. Nine were colored and one white. All of the births were white.
