

MR. EDWARD R. JONES

Dies of Injuries Sustained By a Fall.

Mr. Edward R. Jones, a prominent citizen of south Christian, died Wednesday morning at the home of his brother, Mr. E. Matt Jones, near Newstead.

He had been sick for several days and was threatened with pneumonia. About 3 o'clock Tuesday morning he arose from his bed and walked out on the porch of the second story of the building, from which he fell to the pavement. The noise aroused members of the family and when he was carried into the house an examination disclosed the fact that his collar bone had been broken. He also sustained other injuries, which rendered him unconscious and he remained in that condition until relieved by death.

Mr. Jones was about seventy-five years old and a member of the Christian church. He was a most excellent citizen and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him.

He was a brother of Mr. T. M. Jones, of this city, and also of the late Lucian Jones. He was unmarried. Funeral services were held at the residence yesterday morning by Eld. H. D. Smith and the interment took place in Hope-well cemetery.
