The hymnbooks do not contain a more exquisite lyric than Newman's "Lead, Kindly Light," says Allan Sutherland in the June Delineator, nor one that is more acceptable to all denominations of the Christian faith. When the Parliament of Religions met in Chicago during the Columbian Exposition, the representatives of almost every creed known to man found two things on which they were agreed: The could all join in the Lord's Prayer, and all could sing "Lead, Kindly Light." The hymn was written when Newman, returning home from Italy after a serious illness, was becalmed a week in the sunny waters of the Mediterranean. In striking contrast, the music was composed by Dr. John B. Dykes as he walked through the Strand, one of the busiest thoroughfares of London. The hymn was a favorite of Gladstone, and also of President McKinley, and it was sung far and wide in the churches on the first anniversary of his death and burial.
