PROF. HAMLETT IS CHOSEN

Public School Faculty Increased to Twenty-Six.

FIVE NEW TEACHERS.

Miss Mills, Miss McDaniel and Mrs. Moss Are the Lady Principals.

The School Board, at its meeting Friday night, elected a superintendent, three principals and 22 other lady teachers, the superintendent and five lady teachers being new members of the faculty.

Four members of the Board had caucused and agreed upon Prof. Barksdale Hamlett, of Henderson, and the new superintendent was invited to be present and accept in person. The other three members of the Board united upon Prof. Stover, of Knoxville, Tenn. Only one ballot was taken, although there were twenty or more applicants. Prof. Hamlett was elected by a vote of 4 to 3 and his election was at once made unanimous and all of the members promised him a cordial support.

All of the old teachers except Mrs. R. M. Bramham and Miss Dora Leichhardt, who were not applicants, were re-elected. The filling of these vacancies and the addition of three new grades, made it necessary to choose five new teachers. There were more than a dozen applicants for these places.

The New Superintendent.

Prof. Barksdale Hamlett is a young man only 27 years of age and has a wife and one child. He is of slender physique, has a beardless face and his experience covers a period of seven years, all in Kentucky schools.

He was born in Virginia in 1878 and was graduated from Hampton-Sidney College, Virginia, in 1898, taking the class medal for oratory. He represented his college in an inter-state oratorical contest.

Coming to Kentucky at once, he first taught in a college in Larue county, Ky., for four years. He then went to Corydon, Ky., for two years and during the last year has been principal of one of the city schools in Henderson. He competed with another principal from Henderson, an older man, who had Supt. L. McCartney's endorsement, but he impressed a majority of the trustees more favorably than any other applicant and won fairly on his merits. Prof. Hamlett is a man of high character. He and his wife are members of the Baptist church. Mrs. Hamlett is a native of Hardin county, Ky. The new head of the schools will take charge June 20th.


